PLANNERS of the social, physical, natural, technological, and economic environment. We are strategic thinkers. We take steps today with tomorrow in mind.


GROUP of dynamic, intelligent, and collaborative individuals. We are a network of experts and innovators that give input and challenge each other to create the best product possible.

MISSION

To engage passionate young professionals working in the community development field by providing educational training, social networking events, and professional development opportunities to aid in career advancement and improve planning practices in Virginia's communities.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

- State Co-Chairs (Abbey Ness and Mario Wells): Create and manage YPG programming and resources at the state-level. Tasked with providing the administrative, financial, and marketing support to foster regional YPG systems.
- Regional Committees (RVA, Hampton Roads, NOVA, with Cville and Fredericksburg starting this year): Members of regional committees plan and organize events in their region (section). Events could include, but are not limited to, networking events, skills development trainings, AICP test preparation workshops, tours, book clubs or film showings. Regional committees can be as active as they choose, but should aim for hosting at least three events per year.
- Website Coordinators (Sarah Richards, Ben Holt): Updates website content monthly. Responsibilities may include profiling young planners, updating the AICP resources list, writing blog posts, contributing content to forum discussions and graphic design.
- Special Projects Coordinators: Chairs special projects, such as the creation of a guide for new planners or Community Planning Month programming. The time commitment will be temporary but will vary depending on the project.
- Individual Members: The central focus of YPG programming. YPG serves members by engaging them in professional development activities that evoke and deepen their passions for community planning and development.



APA VA WORK PLAN ITEMS

The Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association (APA VA) has a biannual work plan created by the Board of Directors to outline organizational goals and guide chapter activities. YPG is responsible for several of the work plan items, listed below in the gray boxes. These items are our first priority over the next two years.

PRIMARY GOALS

The following items are our primary goals for the year. They incorporate items from the APA VA work plan whenever possible.



AICP Test Preparation: Young planners desire AICP credentials, but often find AICP test preparation materials to be a financial burden. YPG will support the Professional Development Officer in hosting an AICP test preparation workshop before the spring exam. YPG will investigate broadcasting the session via webinar so remote members can attend virtually.

Skill Development and Training: YPG will host three skills development workshops this year. Partners such as VAMLIS, USGBC, volunteer retirees, university professors or professionals can provide content for such workshops. At the 2015 APA Virginia Annual Conference, YPG sponsored a skills development workshop covering public speaking and proposal writing.



Networking/Social Gatherings: Regional committees across the state organize activities for local members. These events include networking activities that connect YPG members with each other and other planning professionals. Last year, YPG hosted several happy hours allowing YPG members to network informally with graduate students, Ethnical and Cultural Diversity Committee members, and planning directors. This year, we hope to organize more networking events that link YPG members with members of other professional organizations.



Mentor Program: Creating a permanent membership program for YPG members will not be an easy feat. Several YPG members have volunteered to come up with a model for a statewide program to be launched in the fall/winter 2015. FAICP Committee members have agreed to serve as mentors in the program.



Virginia-Specific Educational Experience: Each year, YPG hosts a field trip to cities or regions of Virginia to learn about unique local planning issues and hear from experts in the field. This year, we hope to visit the Eastern Shore of Virginia, where we will learn about regional watershed management, housing affordability and quality, and rural economic development, among other issues. Other learning opportunities could include the New River Valley to learn about collaborative planning processes and citizen engagement or the

Hampton Roads area to learn about coastal resiliency. Last year, we visited the Town of Ashland to learn from local government staff and residents about the Town before making recommendations about how to attract millennials to the area.



Promoting Planning Advocacy: Young planners across the state are advocating for better planning practices in their communities. The "Planning and Advocacy" event series will feature citizen planners and professional planners who dedicate their time and talent outside of work. Anticipated speakers include planning commissioners, leaders of citizen groups, and blog authors, among others. YPG also hopes to plan 1-2 events that transform public spaces through tactical urbanism or grassroots action.

Celebrate Planning Month in October: National Planning Month is a great opportunity to highlight the innovative ideas and energy that young planners bring to the field. Activities organized by regional committees could include awareness campaigns via social media, bike tours, tactical urbanism projects, or educational programs exposing K-12 students to planning principles.

Communication: Last, but not least, YPG will continue to prioritize communication among its members. By continuing our email blasts and social media presence, we hope to effectively let members know about upcoming events and non-YPG professional development opportunities. A website refresh is set for early September.



APA VA Conference: YPG co-chairs will keep Virginia chapter conference rates affordable for young planners to encourage participation. YPG will host professional development and networking events at the conference that meet the needs of young planners.
