OVERVIEW

Students will learn about balancing the successes and challenges of entrepreneurship. They will work in groups to create a business and evaluate the potential challenges of owning such a business.

LEARNING OBJECTIVE(S):

- -Identify business challenges that could potentially arise.
- -Think critically to overcome challenges.
- -Appreciate the rewards that come from being a successful entrepreneur.



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MATERIALS:

Large sheets of paper Colored pencils, markers, crayons Post-it notes

ACTIVITIES:

- 1. Begin the lesson by placing students in small groups of no more than four. Ask students to brainstorm a business they would like to run as a group. The only rule for this activity is that students must draw the idea they choose without using any words.
- 2. After students have thought of their group business, show them the Andrew White Guitars video. Facilitate a discussion about the successes, risks, and challenges that go along with business ownership. In the video, Andrew describes some of the challenges he faced, like losing his home when the economy and sales were bad. Give each group 8-10 post-it notes. Ask students to write potential business successes on half and potential business challenges on the other half. Group by group, have students place their successes on one of half of the board and challenges on the other half. Students should explain each to the class as they bring them to the board.
- 3. When the discussion is complete, ask students to choose the three potential challenges that they think are most likely. Once again, ask students to draw these challenges without the use of words.
- 4. Have each group talk the class through the drawings of their business ideas and challenges. After each group finishes sharing their challenges, brainstorm possible solutions as a class. Again, have students write these solutions on post-it notes and stick them on the board.
