Hill has been Executive Director of the Chattanooga Public Library since March 2012. Hill is a sought-after public speaker and thought leader on the future of public libraries. She addressed the FCC during the 2013 Broadband Summit and was a presenter on the Leadership & Collaborative Innovation panel at the NextLibrary 2013 Conference in Denmark. Hill was recently elected by The International Federation

of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) to serve on the Governing Board's Standing Committee for the 2013-2017 term. She is also the 2013 recipient of the Urban Libraries Council's Joey

Rodgers Leadership Award. Hill was recently selected as Library Journal's 2014 Librarian of the Year. Prior to Chattanooga, Hill served as the Interim Director of Libraries for the Dallas Public Library. She is a current member of the American Library Association, The Public Library Association, and Reforma / National Association to Promote Library Services to Latinos.

Prior to this position, Ms. Butler served as the Information Systems Project Manager for the Contra Costa County Library, in Pleasant Hill, CA. and as the Data Training Coordinator, as well as various other positions, for the Denver Public Library in Colorado. In 2002, Library Journal named Ms. Butler one of America's "Movers & Shakers". #### About the Presenters:

Matt Hamilton serves as the IT Manager for the Denver Public Library, previously working as IT Director for Anythink Libraries and the Boulder Public Library in Colorado. Matt's approach to IT is heavily influenced by service design, retail trends, and participatory learning models. Matt has recently completed a book on Makerspaces in Libraries and has been a dedicated Maker since building his first computer as a child.

Brian Pichman is the Director of Strategic Innovation at the Evolve Project. He speaks a lot about innovative technology as a presenter and loves collaborating with both libraries and companies. He is dedicated to bring libraries into the future using cost effective measures and strategies. Much of Evolve's work includes bridging the digital divide, breaking away from "traditional library views", becoming trend setters and finding or building innovative works geared towards interaction and collaboration. He has also been working with start-up companies across the country, promoting libraries and encouraging people to work closer with libraries in developing new ideas and concepts.



#### **Mark Frauenfelder**

Mark Frauenfelder is the founder of Boing Boing, a blog about cultural curiosities and interesting technologies with 4 million monthly unique viewers and the winner of the Bloggies' Lifetime Achievement and Best Group Blog awards. He is also the editor-in-chief of MAKE, the only magazine exclusively devoted to doit-yourself projects. He's the founding editor-in-chief of Wired Online, and was an editor at Wired magazine and Wired

Books from 1993-1998. He was Playboy magazine's technology columnist for three years. He is also the ditor-in-chief of Cool-Tools.org, a tool review site with roots connected to the Whole Earth Catalog. As a maker of things, Mark has built cigar box guitars, skateboards, electronic musical instruments, chicken coops, kinetic sculptures, and robotic monkeys that keep cats from jumping on furniture. He has conducted workshops that teach people how to make sauerkraut, program Arduino microcontrollers, solder circuit boards, build vibrating toothbrush cars, and construct mandolins from tuna cans. Mark is also an artist and designer, and his work has appeared in

group and solo gallery exhibitions throughout the United States. He designed Billy Idol's "Cyberpunk" CD cover, video box, and print advertisements.

He has appeared on The Colbert Report (twice) and the Martha Stewart Show, and has written for The New York Times Magazine, The Atlantic, Popular Science, Business Week, The Hollywood Reporter, Wired, and other national publications.

#### **Making Makers:**

In the last five years people have started making new tools and technologies that enable anyone to be a maker. Creating access to these tools and materials as well as the opportunity to share and collaborate with others is essential to the maker experience. Starting with a colorful history of 19th and 20th century making, Frauenfelder will present the new tools and technologies that are driving innovation and giving individuals and small groups the ability to create amazing things that would've been out of their reach a few years ago. He then will present new, inexpensive, and effective ways to conduct research and development, design prototypes, and set up manufacturing at home, and in makerspaces, libraries, schools, companies, and other spaces. ## Sarah Davidon IFC Keynote Speaker

"Why my father stole secrets from J. Edgar Hoover: Moral responsibility in the face of injustice"

In March of 1971, before Edward Snowden was even born, a group calling themselves the Citizens' Commission to Investigate the FBI broke in to a small FBI office in Media, Pennsylvania and discovered documents that exposed dragnet government surveillance and illegal activities conducted by J. Edgar Hoover that changed history. My father, William C

Davidon, was the one that asked this question of a small group of people that he trusted, "What would you think of breaking in to an FBI office?" There were rumors that the FBI was spying on college campuses, peaceful

anti-war groups, and civil rights leaders, yet nobody could provide the proof. My father – a physicist – wanted to find a more aggressive but non-violent means to provide hard evidence that would expose injustices and protect civil liberties. As history repeats itself in many ways today, it is imperative that we continue to find ways to protect the principles of democracy.

Sarah Davidon was 3 years old at the time of the 1971 Media action. She grew up in Haverford, Pennsylvania where her father was a physics and mathematics professor and mother a freelance writer. From an early age, Sarah's parents would actively engage her and her sister in thoughtful discussion about a commitment to taking action when there is injustice and violence. Growing up, inaction was not an option in the Davidon household. Sarah received her BA from Bryn Mawr College, and MEd from Harvard University Graduate School of Education. She is currently on the faculty of the University of Colorado School of Medicine while also working on a doctorate in Leadership for Educational Equity.



#### **Tricia Bengel**

Tricia began her library career at 15 in her Kentucky hometown as a Page. After finishing her MLS at the University of KY, she has worked for a library vendor, two State libraries and most recently at Nashville Public Library in Tennessee. In 2011, she was named a Library Journal Mover and Shaker. She is most interested in designing programs that fit the needs of the local community and using technology in

creative ways. For the past four years, Tricia has focused on creating an innovative partnership between her public library and the local school system, culminating in a merger of the two systems.

#### Topic:

It all began with a big idea: give students easy access to the best educational resources and learning materials in our libraries and on the Internet. In 2009, Nashville Mayor Karl Dean asked Nashville Public Library to take the lead in a new partnership between the public and school libraries, with NPL recommending specific steps to improve the school libraries, to foster resource sharing between the two institutions, and to improve student access to learning materials. NPL was charged with collection development and purchasing for school libraries to meet state standards for volumes and quality of materials. A pilot project with 3 high schools and a 9th grade academy began 2009. City funding was expanded to carry the program forward to all 16 area high schools in the 2010-2011 school year. The 2011-2012 school year brought more expansion. With the 2012-2013 school year, Limitless Libraries began serving all 140 MNPS schools!

# The Julie J. Boucher Lecture on Intellectual Freedom

Since 1997, the Julie J. Boucher Memorial Lecture series has provided a showcase for speakers on intellectual freedom for the Colorado library community. With the financial support of the Boucher Memorial Fund, the CAL Intellectual Freedom Committee has brought in a diverse group of authors, journalists, attorneys, educators, and librarians who all share a passion for intellectual freedom and have presented interesting and informative lectures at our state library conference.

Julie J. Boucher was a passionate and outspoken opponent of censorship. In addition to her professional role as the Associate Director of the Library Research Service at the Colorado State Library from 1991-1996, Julie served as the chair of the Colorado Library Association's Intellectual Freedom Committee in 1996. Sadly, she died in a mountain-climbing accident on October 12, 1996, together with her husband, Clive F. Baillie, a University of Colorado computer researcher.

Julie and Clive's parents created the Boucher Memorial Fund to honor Julie's commitment to intellectual freedom. CLA also honored her memory by naming its intellectual freedom award after Julie. In 1999, Julie's name was added to the American Library Association's Office for Intellectual Freedom/Freedom to Read Foundation's 30th Anniversary Honor Roll. With the creation of CAL, the Boucher Fund was continued to support the promotion of intellectual freedom throughout Colorado by providing educational opportunities like the annual lecture series.

An African story teller once said the first instrument God created was the human voice. Sticks, percussion instruments (generating sound from striking), are probably a close second. Eventually the drum would be developed. The drum has long been used in many parts of the world for celebration, ritual/religion, military ceremony and communication. Hand drums are relatively easy to play and provide an opportunity to build community reaching across generations and cultures. The drums used for this workshop are mostly of African, Afro-Caribbean and Middle Eastern origins. (Max participants: 15)


