Catalyzing climate action for resilient development - Workshop

Bonn | 5 June 2015

Introduction

Climate actions by cities, companies, civil society groups, and other actors, individually and in cooperation with each other and with nation states, have great potential to contribute to a low-carbon and climate resilient future. This potential has been increasingly recognized within the UNFCCC process, where non-state actions are showcased in technical examinations and reports, to inspire greater ambition among national governments.

The "groundswell" of non-state and subnational climate action is sometimes seen as driven by the global North. While research shows that Northern actors tend to initiate more "bottom up" actions than Southern actors, it also shows that many cities, companies, national governments, and other actors in the South are taking advantage of these strategies to build low carbon, climate-resilient development. These pioneers demonstrate the extraordinary potential of these kinds of actions to meet immediate development needs ranging from economic inclusion, to health, to agriculture, to energy access. This workshop seeks to expand the scale and ambition of the groundswell of climate actions in the Global South as a way to make sure that this emerging feature of the climate regime directly addresses the needs and priorities of developing countries.

Aims of the workshop

The workshop addresses the much heard critique that - up until now - the discussion on non-state climate action is very 'northern driven'. Given the fact that most non-state climate actions are northern-led, although needs are greatest in developing countries, the event addresses the question how non-state (and sub-national) climate actions could be catalyzed in developing countries. Moreover, the aim is to explore how governments, UNFCCC secretariat, and other organizations could ensure more effective non-state action in developing countries, possibly building on existing initiatives, such as the Non-state Actor Zone for Climate Actions (NAZCA) platform.

In the workshop (in the morning and afternoon of June 5th) experts from developing and developed countries discuss (1) barriers to, and opportunities for non-state climate action in developing countries; and (2) how governments, UNFCCC secretariat, and other organizations could ensure more effective non-state action in developing countries.

Program of the workshop

The workshop programme will address:

- Climate actions beyond mitigation, addressing sustainable development (co-)benefits
- Engaging business in climate action in developing countries
- Strengthening climate action in national and local contexts
- Creating synergies at the national and international levels of climate action

The workshop will feature smaller break-out groups, moderated by experts from science, policy, business and civil society. This format ensures interaction, and joint-up thinking about climate actions for resilient development in developing countries.

A reception, co-hosted with the UNFCCC secretariat will be hosted at the World Conference Center Bonn (the venue of the UNFCCC climate conference).
