Emerson College Poll: GOP Holds a Slight Lead in North Carolina Presidential and Senate Races

BOSTON, MA - A new Emerson College poll in North Carolina finds Donald Trump leading Hillary Clinton 45% to 43%, with Libertarian candidate Gary Johnson at 8%, Jill Stein at 2%, and 2% undecided. The poll of 800 likely voters was conducted August 27-29 and had a margin of error of 3.4 percentage points.

Clinton has a 14-point favorability deficit, with 42% of voters viewing her favorably and 56% unfavorably. Trump's gap is -18 points; 39% have a favorable view of him compared to 57% with an unfavorable opinion. Clinton has a 93% loyalty score, meaning 93% of those with a positive view of her plan to vote for her. Trump's loyalty score is 96%. While the ballot test is close, Clinton holds a 54% to 33% lead when voters are asked whom they expect to win the election. Ninety-two percent (92%) of Clinton voters believe she will prevail, while only 66% of Trump supporters think he will.

Both candidates are winning 81% of their own party's vote. Independents favor Trump over Clinton 45% to 34%, with Johnson getting 14%. Candidate preference continues to break by gender, with men supporting Trump 47% to 37% and women preferring Clinton 49% to 44%. Trump's strongest age cohort is the 35-54 group, where he is ahead 51% to 39%. Clinton does best with voters 18-34. She has a 46% to 32% advantage with that age group.

It appears race is playing a pivotal role in the race. White voters break for Trump 63% to 24%, while African-Americans favor Clinton 75% to 16%. She also has a wide lead with Hispanics (59% to 15%) and multiracial voters (94% to 6%).

Trump's strongest support is in the eastern and western parts of the state, where he is winning 47% to 45% and 53% to 36%, respectively. He and Clinton are in a statistical dead heat in the central region, with each having 42% of the vote. Clinton leads 62% to 31% in the Greensboro/Charlotte area.

In the U.S. Senate race, Republican incumbent Richard Burr holds a 4-point edge over his Democratic opponent Deborah Ross, 45% to 41%, with 5% choosing someone else and 8% undecided. However, Burr has an image problem with 40% of voters viewing him unfavorably compared to 32% who have a favorable opinion; 23% were undecided about him, and 6% had never heard of him. Ross suffers from lower name recognition, with 16% of voters having no recollection of her, and 35% of voters undecided. Among those who know of Ross, she has a 27% favorable/23% unfavorable rating.

CALLER ID:

The Emerson College Polling Society North Carolina poll was conducted from August 27-29, 2016. The sample consisted of 800 likely general election voters with a margin of error of +/- 3.4%. It is important to remember that subsets based on gender, age and party breakdowns carry with them higher margins of error, as the sample size is reduced. Data was weighted by 2012 election results and regional weights. The state was broken into four regions based on Congressional districts. The East was comprised of districts 1,3,7, and 13; North Central included districts 4 and 6; South Central consisted of districts 2,8, and 9; Greensboro/Charlotte was made up of district 12, and the West encompassed districts 5,10, and 11. Data was collected using an Interactive Voice Response (IVR) system of landlines only. The full methodology and results can be found at www.theecps.com.
