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Where Are We Going And What Should We Do?

I was saved in 1955 and joined an evangelical Baptist church. In the 1960's I read Earnest Pickering's book on "Biblical Separation" and "Axioms of Separation" by John Ashbrook, as well as a book by Charles Woodbridge called "The New Evangelicalism." I realized the compromise that was within our church and decided to align my family with what we call fundamental churches.

I have been traveling the fundamental path for over fifty years, and have watched the deterioration of fundamentalism. For example, I saw the Thomas Road Baptist Church of Lynchburg, Virginia, go from a fundamental church to a place where Catholics are welcome to take part in their ministry, rock singers are welcome, and this year they featured a Mormon who promoted his Mormon beliefs during his message. We could list many churches that were fundamental ten years ago that are promoting apostasy today.

The fundamental movement is far worse now than the evangelical movement was when I left it in the 1960's. Anyone who can't see that is spiritually ignorant or willfully blind to what is happening. The question is where are we heading and what should the sincere Christian do?

Unmet Expectations

At the root of much, if not most of our discouragement, is unmet expectations.

Before starting FaithWay Baptist Church at Ajax, Ontario, I made a list of the people I **expected** would come to our first meeting. **None of them came**.

When we began the FaithWay Baptist College of Canada we **expected** to start the first year with fifty students. Prior to opening we traveled from coast to coast letting people know about the new college. **We started with seven.** If we will go about our God-given responsibilities and not be concerned about our expectations it will go far in winning the battle over discouragement.

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The Instructions From Jude

"But, beloved, **remember ye the words** which were spoken before of the apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ; How that they told you there should be mockers in the last time, who should walk after their own ungodly lusts" (Jude 1:17,18).

Jude began his discussion of the situation with a focus on the remnant that was concerned about the situation. He said "Beloved...it was needful for me to write unto you" (V.3).

After an explicit discussion concerning the apostasy and the apostates who promoted it, Jude focused again on the "beloved." In verses seventeen through twenty-five he gave some insights concerning what the faithful can do in an age of apostasy.

I. Remember It Was Prophesied

<u>Jude 1:17,18,</u>

"But, beloved, <u>remember</u> ye the words which were spoken before of the apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ; How that they told you there should be mockers in the last time, who should walk after their own ungodly lusts."

Second Timothy 3:1-3,

"**This know** also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves...Traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God."

Second Peter 2:1-3,

"But there were false prophets also among the people, even as there shall be false teachers among you, who privily shall bring in damnable heresies, even denying the Lord that bought them, and bring upon themselves swift destruction. And many shall follow their pernicious ways; by reason of whom the way of truth shall be evil spoken of. And through covetousness shall they with feigned words make merchandise of you."

Apostasy In The Local Churches

The apostasy we are facing today was prophesied 2000 years ago. The world has always been "lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God." The Bible says apostasy will happen in our churches during "the last days." In verse five it says they would be, "Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof."

We need to face the facts. The false teachers that Peter said would be "among" us are among us!

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If we expect everyone to appreciate our efforts, we will soon be discouraged. If there are some people we expect should be in church next week and they don't come we tend to get discouraged. We would be better off to expect no one to come and then we can be encouraged if anyone shows up.

Handling Disappointments

We must face the fact that disappointments are a part of life. If we assume we are not going to be disappointed, every disappointment that comes along will be more discouraging than the one before it.

A Choice

In Hebrews 13:5 the Christian is commanded to, "be content;" however, we cannot be content simply because someone commands us to be content, even if the command comes from God. If we are going to achieve contentment we will need to "Study to show ourselves approved unto God," concerning how to make contentment a reality in our lives.

In Philippians 4:11-13 Paul said.

"I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." He continued, "I know both how to be abased, and I know how to abound: every where and in all things I am instructed both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need."

3. Educate And Expose

Hosea 4:6,

Paul said, "I am content." However, he qualified that in First Corinthians 15:10 where he said, "By the grace of God I am what I am."

"Written For Our Admonition"

Psalm 62:5.

"My soul, wait thou only upon God; for my expectation is from him."

The Hebrew word "wait" in this verse is "damam." It has been translated "silence" six times and "silent" four times.

The soul is the mind, the will, and the emotions. The Psalmist is telling his mind, will and emotions to be silent before God.

The greatest source of discouragement for the preacher is the fact that things are not happening in the church like we wish they would.

If we allow the devil to discourage us for this reason we will be discouraged until we die.

C. H. Spurgeon's Words of Encouragement



I remember years ago meeting with that blessed servant of God, the late Earl of Shaftesbury. He was at Mentone with a dying daughter, and he happened that day to be very much downcast, as, indeed, I have frequently seen him, and as, I am sorry to confess, he has also frequently seen me. That day he was particularly cast down about the general state of society. He thought that the powers of darkness in this country were having it all their own way, and that, before long, the worst elements of society would gain power, and trample out all virtue.

Looking up into his face, I said to him, "And is God dead? Do you believe that while God lives the devil will conquer him?" He smiled, and we walked along by the Mediterranean communing together in a far more hopeful tone."
