Dear Friends,

Back in January when Bishop Carcaño asked us to do a survey for the Annual Conference, there were one or two references to our practice of weekly communion. As a result, I took that issue to the council and asked for input from them. After discussion, we decided to continue the practice of offering communion every week.

Traditionally, the Methodist churches have not been "sacramental," with an emphasis on holiness rather than the sacraments of the church. I remember a Methodist friend in high school who only received communion on Maundy Thursday. There is a note tacked to the communion cupboard in the flower/communion room that indicates that communion was served here at Belmont Heights once a quarter plus Maundy Thursday and possibly on Easter or Christmas.

Another part of the Protestant practice of having communion less often is a negative reaction to the weekly mass of the Roman Catholic tradition that *always* includes communion.

Forty or fifty years ago and more, the church offered a place to gather for social events, for support of missions in the community and beyond, and for worship and religious practice. Members of church bodies spent a large part of their leisure time together, far beyond Sunday mornings only.

In more recent years, nonprofit organizations have dramatically increased in number. In 1942 Peter Dobkin Hall wrote, "In 1940, there were only 12,500 secular charitable tax-exempt organizations; today there are over 700,000." The Foundation Center, which maintains information about philanthropy worldwide, reports that there are more than 1.5 million nonprofits in the United States today.

These organizations highlight areas of need and provide people an outlet for working with like-minded people on causes that are important to them. The church is no longer the only player in the areas of food and hunger issues, poverty, education, health, etc. I expect that most church members are also members of at least one civic, school, or social organization that is doing good work in the community.

How does this affect the mission of the church? Do we give up on raising awareness of hunger, poverty, injustice, etc.? No! But I think it is important for us to recognize and celebrate the mission work that our members do in other contexts.

All that being said, I believe that in the 21st century, our "ritual" of Holy Communion (the Eucharist, the Lord's Supper, communion) is the one thing that sets us apart from other organizations. We gather together for the primary purpose of worshipping together. We gather to be in the body of believers. We gather together to be in the presence of Jesus Christ.

If we truly believe that Jesus Christ is present in the bread and the cup of communion, what better way to be in his presence than to celebrate Holy Communion every time we gather?

As with all things that become "common" through repetition, we recognize that the communion liturgy might be somewhat boring in its sameness week after week. Therefore, we will be offering some modifications and changes now and then to raise our awareness of the meaning of the words and the ritual we offer.

But we will continue to offer the presence of Christ in the bread and the cup each week.




Maundy Thursday, April 17, 2014 7PM

Water Day

Saturday, March 22, 2014 was World Water Day, sponsored by United Nations and The united Methodist Committee On Relief (UMCOR). According to the United Nations, at least 780 million people and as many as 3.5 billion people lack access to clean drinking water; an estimated 2.5 billion people are without sanitation. The demand for water grows as our global population increases and societies continue to develop. We cannot produce any more water, but we can use what we have more wisely.

While we missed Water Day itself, here are some thoughts for conserving water every day:

- 1. **Speed up your shower**. A 4-minute shower uses 20-40 gallons of water.
- 2. **Check for leaks** in pipes and faucets, especially your landscaping system.
- 3. Landscape with drought-resistant plants.
- Conserve energy. Ninety percent of power generation is water-intensive, so turning off lights and unplugging unused appliances will help conserve water.
- **Advocate on-line.** Use Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. to tell the world to join the effort. Use an image from UMCOR's website as your profile picture for a few days to promote the cause.
- 6. **Donate!** UMCOR's Water and Sanitation (WASH) programs improve access to clean water around the world. Donations to Advance #3020600 keep water projects afloat.

TAX SEASON

Taxpayers throughout America can now get free assistance preparing and filing their income tax returns.

Taxpayers who want help can go to any of the 400 IRS Taxpayer Assistance Centers nationwide. For those taxpayers who earned less than \$58,000 last year, the IRS also offers free brand-named tax software through its Free File Program.

Finally, please note that the IRS is no longer mailing forms to every taxpayer. However, you can obtain the tax forms you need by calling 1-800-TAX-FORMS (1-800-829-3676).
