They met strenuous opposition in this speedy Royal City game, and it was nip and tuck for the first half hour, but after that the league leaders forged ahead and practically clinched the game before the end of the second period, although New Westminster made a desperate attempt to even up in the final session, and scored a couple of times in rapid succession, but the local stars came up with another of their great rushes and brilliant work by Newey Lalonde and Frank Patrick resulted in two more goals, that put the game safe and again played Vancouver in the foremost position for league honors.

If Eastern teams at their best serve up a better brand of hockey than was witnessed last night, those who attended will have to be shown to be convinced. They were treated to one of the grandest and most scientific exhibitions of the ice hockey game ever played, and the game will go down in the annals of hockey as one of the greatest ever played between two league teams.

Two players on the Vancouver team who stood out head and shoulders above the rest of the puck chasers gave the spectators some of the best hockey they have ever seen. They were Frank Patrick and Newey Lalonde, and to say that their performance was sensational would be putting it mildly. They were always in the limelight, and between them they scored all of Vancouver's goals, the captain of the new league leaders nothing half a dozen, while Lalonde came through with regularity, his powerful stick and crowd wild with enthusiasm with his wonderful work on the steel blades. Although handicapped with a badly bruised eye, he was in the thick of the fray from the start, and scored five times for the locals before even Lalonde broke into the scoring sheets. In regularizing his play, Patrick was the local captain set a new Canadian record for a defence player, and although playing point in all of the matches he has scored twenty-three goals, and is tied with Lalonde for first place among the leading goal getters. Newey is also credited with twenty-three, but as he is forward and Patrick a defence man the latter's record is all the more creditable and puts the Vancouver manager in a class by himself among Canadian hockeyists. Every member of the Vancouver team played great hockey. Parr in goal had one of his best nights in the cage and made a number of hair-raising saves, on one occasion coming right out of his net to block a shot from McDonald, St. Germain worked like a Trojan, and stopped a number of rushes. Tommy Phillips played in his old Kenna form and was very effective, while Harris and Nichols did a lot of useful work, checking effectively and working in with Phillips and Lalonde. That it was the Lalonde-Patrick combination that had New Westminster beaten. They worked their rushes to perfection, and while they got ten goals between them, they really earned a few more, and only lost them by timely intervention by the opposing defence men.

James Gardner, the hardest-working individual on the New Westminster team, and was ably backed up by Harry Hyland, but outside of this pair the others were only good in spots. Treherne was a passenger in the first period and spoiled a lot of fine chances by being stuck in the net. McDonald was checked up too closely to be effective, while Johnson and McLean had too much work on the defence to enable them to be of any assistance to the forwards. Lehman in goal stopped some hard shots and held the score down by his good work. Those shots that did get through he had to chance for as the chances of the Vancouver team were great up to the mark and they were striking from a line for the cage all night.

The puck was terrible for the first twenty minutes, and it is a wonder that the players were not all in when the interval arrived. They came out back, however, stronger and faster than ever, and would up with whirlwind rushes that were comparable to any seen, although a couple of nervous errors that resulted in two goals for the visitors.

Only one player was checked out in the first period, St. Germain showing a three minute check. In the second session eight players were sent off and the period was ended with a couple of impromptu scraps. Harry Hyland and Bobby Nichols came to blows and were taking it seriously when other players intervened and they were sent off for five minutes. Then Harris and McLean started working their sticks like tomahawks and two minutes penalized them for it. In the third period the players were sent off for minor infractions of the rules, while there were a couple of delays in the game, one was a couple of minutes when the referee appeared Frank had a big player to follow each up, not having fully recovered from the injury sustained in last period's match.

Important Changes May Be Made in Lacrosse Rules on Coast This Year

Westminster Official Will Ask B. C. L. A. to Adopt New Rules.

IMPORTANT changes will be made in the rules of the B. C. Lacrosse Association this year if the executive of the provincial governing body heeds the suggestions of Mr. C. A. Walsh, former manager of the New Westminster Lacrosse Club. Mr. Walsh's new rules will come up before the league at tonight's meeting in New Westminster, if he is able to attend the meeting. He was over for the hockey match last night and stated that it was just possible that he would be out of the city today, but that he would make an effort to have the changes in the rules, as suggested by him, laid before the meeting.

In the opinion of Mr. Walsh the game would be made much faster if the time of the quarter was reduced from 10 minutes to 15 minutes. This would allow the players to travel at top speed through every quarter and would make the game faster and more interesting to the spectator. Mr. Walsh also advocates a 10-minute rest between each quarter so that the players will have a chance to get their wind after fifteen minutes of whirlwind play and recuperate enough to go back onto the field with plenty of speed and stamina. This also would give a player with a slight injury a chance to recover and play better for the rest of the game than if he were forced onto the field in a weak condition, when he could not do justice to himself nor the public.

Another important change advocated by Mr. Walsh is one that has been in vogue in baseball ever since that game was played. He wants the rules altered so that each team may be allowed to change at least two players at any time during the progress of a game.

REASONS FOR THE CHANGE.

There are times when a player goes on the field in apparently good condition and feeling well, but he is unable to play with the usual snap and vim. For some reason his stamina is temporarily impaired and he plays a slow, sluggish game, though at the time he is really working harder than when he is in fine fettle and playing brilliantly. Then again, a man may develop slight stomach trouble from violent exercise in the sunlight, and under these circumstances the captain should have the right to take off the players and replace them with other men so as to keep up the speed of the game. The present rule gives the option of dropping a player allowing a team to replace an injured or sick man with another player, but the plan of dropping a player usually proves disastrous to the combination of a team and results in poor playing. All this would be done away with if a captain were allowed to replace his slow men with the best material at his command. With twenty-four men on the field it stands to reason that one or two on each side would not be in the very best of condition, and it is with the object of always having the best men of the teams on the field that Mr. Walsh advocates this change in the rules. He also thinks it would make the game faster if the goals were placed 100 yards apart, instead of 110, as at present, and he would like to see this change made.

In all his goals Frank was not favored by any luck. He took no long shots but wormed his way right through all opposition and then after pulling the goaltender out of place would slide the puck through the posts at what was seemingly an impossible angle. It was a marvellous display and will live long in the memories of those who saw the game.

Lalonde Also in Great Trim.

Second only to the brilliant playing of Patrick was the clever display by "Newsy" Lalonde, who was feeling good last night and went like a house afire all through the three periods. Lalonde increased his goal-getting figures by four counters last night, and now he and Frank Patrick are tied for first place on the season's total with twenty-three goals each. With Patrick and Lalonde performing in such a manner, Allan Parr in goal again making sensational stops, and the other players on the team working better than ever before this season, it was little wonder that the Vancouver team won last night and that the Westminster team, fresh and full of life after a long rest, should go

Violation of Baseball Rules.

Cincinnati, March 6.—The National Baseball Commission yesterday promulgated a finding whereby player Anthony Walsh must be taken by the Chicago Nationals from the Terre Haute club, which recently purchased him from the Newark club of the New England League. The finding further says that the Chicago club will be given ten days in which to dispose of the player's services to a major league club or a Class A club. If it decides not to retain him, and that if this is found impossible, the Fall River club shall be given the privilege of purchase. The commission contended that in the transfer of Walsh to Newark by Chicago, and subsequently from Newark to Terre Haute, which is in the same classification as Fall River, the rules of organized baseball had been violated.

As usual the match between the president and vice-president's rinks was played by northern curlers only, who, being more numerous than those from the south had to be left out of the grand match. During the day Davidson Smith despatched the following telegram to Col. Aikman, in command of the Scottish curlers in Canada: "Two thousand curlers assembled at the grand match send hearty greetings to team and brother curlers in Canada and the States. Lovely day." Three classes, Employed Boys, Senior School and Young Men's class, compete, single event winners being presented with suitable badges, while gold and silver medals are presented to the highest point winners.

American Bowling Congress Considers Amendments to Rules at Annual Meeting.

Chicago, March 6.—Gold medals were awarded to three men at yesterday's meeting of the executive committee of the American Bowling Congress. They are Geo. F. Stutz, Des Moines; B. H. Waller, Detroit, Mich.; and Anton Stehno, Chicago.

Two amendments of importance were offered, one changing the weight of the pins from three pounds and four ounces to two pounds and twelve ounces, as a minimum, and three pounds and six ounces as a maximum, provided that no more than six ounces difference exist in any set.

The other amendment was offered by Secretary Langtry and provided that any "ringer" caught in future tournaments be barred forever from the American Bowling Congress.

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TRIPS BEFORE GOAL IN MAJOR FOUL LIST

As Things Are, Temptation to a Defense Player to Commit a Foul is Great.

With the hockey season of 1913 fast drawing to finish, close students of the game have had time to examine the new rules thoroughly.
The general opinion seems to be that they're all right, says the Montreal Herald. But the fact remains that the advent of the six-man team has led to perhaps the most strenuous season in the history of the game. A casual glance at any of the players who have played through the whole season will show that at once. Hardly one of them but is trained down to about the limit and chances are that a little longer season would lead to a general cracking up all around. Part is that are not sufficient reserves on any of the teams who are of any class.
But while the new rules have led to a faster game, just as was anticipated for them by the men who framed them, and just as the penalty lines which permit of six-men teams of equal strength on the ice all the time, have served their purpose there are one or two points which will undoubtedly be changed next season. One of these is the placing on the minor penalty line of a trip when such a trip is committed to save a goal.
Officer than once this season a defense player has "stopped" a fast coming opposing forward who looked to have the puck almost at his mercy by the simple expedient of hooking a foot from underneath him or of committing a foul which put the forward off his game and at the same time saves the goal.
The offending player knows that the worst that will happen to him is to get a caution from the referee--a small price to pay for the saving of a certain goal.
A foul of this sort, properly, should be placed in the category of major fouls and probably will be.
