Tampering, Illness, Or Adulteration Reports* For Foods (Including Beverages) And Drugs

- 1. Adulteration of drugs without evidence of container tampering, or evidence of tampering, before retail sale. **FDA**
- Adulteration of foods, not including meats packaged outside Ohio, without evidence of container tampering.

 FDA
- 3. Adulteration of meats packaged outside Ohio without evidence of container tampering. USDA (FDA or ODA if unable to contact USDA.)
- 4. Adulteration of foods, including meats packaged in Ohio, without evidence of container tampering or tampering before retail sale. **ODA**
- 5. Foods, including meats, showing no evidence of tampering and suspected to cause food illness:
 - a. If purchased in a grocery store or other food establishment. ODA, Local Health Department.
 - b. If purchased in a restaurant or other food service operation. Local Health District, ODH Infectious Disease Control and/or Bureau of Local Services.
- 6. Foods or drugs with evidence of tampering or adulteration <u>after</u> retail sale. Police Department (Local police agencies should notify the FBI).

For investigative coordination, it is recommended each case be directly referred to the agency of primary jurisdiction so the agency can communicate with the complainant. The following are contacts:
