Funds for the donations were raised from the Club's Annual Fashion Show, the partnership with the New Unto Others Thrift Store in Glendora, and from the Club's Rose Garden Benefit Tea held at the Singer Mansion, said President Cunningham.

The Glendora Woman's Club, organized in 1908, has a long history of involvement and service in Glendora. It presently is one of the oldest, active service organizations in Glendora, and one that maintains its own clubhouse.

In 2012, the Club celebrated the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of one of the Club's major accomplishments – founder of the Glendora Public Library in 1912.
