Pat's Rib Place now selling sauces online, in restaurant

WAUKESHA — It gives local business owner Alisha Hayes great joy to hear people, especially young children, who come into Pat's Rib Place, 151 W. Sunset Drive in Waukesha, and mention her sauces by name.

"A little kid will come in and say I want Chunky (a sauce with an apple flavor). They know them by heart," said Hayes who, with her husband, Tydus, have owned the business for the past five years.

The aforementioned sauces, which could previously be found only on tables at the restaurants, can now be purchased for takeout or ordered online. Customers can choose from Pat's House Sauce, which Hayes describes as a mild sauce and the restaurant's most popular sauce, Alisha's Special and "Mad Dog," the restaurant's spiciest sauce, which also has its own T-shirt.

"I really feel like a lot of people drink the sauce," said Hayes, observing a lot of empty sauce bottles on the tables at the end of the day. "The meat is great by itself,

the sauce is just a bonus."

Hayes said customers who have moved away have contacted her to say how much they miss the sauces, and now they can have a taste of their former hometown.

"This is going to be so great in terms of accessibility for those who live out of town," she said.

Online and in-store sales began this week. Hayes said the sauces are sold in Mason jars, and can be refilled at a discounted price. She also is eyeing selling the sauces in area stores in the future.

Hayes is a proud 2004 graduate of Carroll University who serves both on the alumni and president's councils there. So when she needed help designing a logo for her sauces, she knew right where to go.

"I had all the components in place except for one thing," said Hayes.

Carroll senior Hannah Amodeo found out about that opportunity through graphic design professor Julie Von Dervellen. Amodeo is familiar with the restaurant business as her parents run a small family restaurant in Michigan. "I'm always into supporting local businesses,"

said Amodeo, who added that the food, customer service, and atmosphere at Pat's are "crazy good."

Most of the work done on the project was done over the phone and via email, said Amodeo. Hayes remained confident throughout the project and said she thought the whole thing turned out well.

"I was pretty confident from the first draft she sent me," said Hayes, who takes every opportunity to give back to Carroll including giving a discount to customers who present their Carroll IDs. "I do get a lot of students in here to eat and talk."

The Pioneer football team will play Benedictine University at 1 p.m. Saturday at Carroll's Schneider Stadium, and Pat's will be serving up their famous pulled pork and brisket for purchase. Don't worry; you can try their sauces on site.

"If I don't bring them, they'll mob me," Hayes said.

During the month of September, 20 percent of online proceeds from sauce, T-shirts and hats will go to benefit the Sisters4 Cure, an organization dedicated to the elimination of breast cancer.

Applications for U.S. unemployment rise to 315,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — More people sought U.S. unemployment benefits last week, though the trend in benefit applications in the past month remained low.

The Labor Department says that weekly applications for unemployment aid rose 11,000 to a seasonally adjusted 315,000, the most since late June. Still, the four-week average of applications, a less volatile measure, rose just 750 to 304,000. The average is 7.1 percent lower than it was a year ago.

First 2 bills in Tesla deal sail through Assembly

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — The first two bills designed to seal a deal to bring Tesla Motors' \$5 billion battery factory to Nevada sailed through the Assembly unanimously Thursday as one lawmaker called the project the biggest thing to hit the state since the Hoover Dam.

After just two minutes of debate, the Assembly voted 39-0 and sent to the Senate a bill that would help finance Tesla's tax breaks by ending a \$125 million subsidy to insurance companies that locate their home offices in Nevada.

On another 39-0 vote about eight minutes later, they approved discounted electricity rates for the electric-car maker's "gigafactory" expected to help create more than 20,000 jobs and inject up to \$100 billion into the state's economy over the next 20 years.

13 percent from the \$147.9 billion deficit recorded in August 2013, the Treasury Department said Thursday in its monthly budget report.

With just one month left in the budget year, the deficit totals \$589.2 billion, 22 percent below last year's 11-month total.

Average U.S. 30-year mortgage rate at 4.12 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Average long-term U.S. mortgage rates rose slightly this week but remained near their lows for the year.

Mortgage company Freddie Mac says the nationwide average for a 30-year loan edged up to 4.12 percent from 4.10 percent last week, where it had stayed for three straight weeks.

The average for a 15-year mortgage, a popular choice for people who are refinancing, rose to 3.26 percent from 3.24 percent.

Alliance Data to buy Conversant for \$2.3 billion

NEW YORK (AP) — Alliance Data said it plans to boost its digital marketing business by buying Conversant for about \$2.3 billion.

The deal is expected to close by the end of the year, the companies said Thursday. Dallas-based Alliance Data manages credit cards and loyalty programs for retailers such as Lane Bryant, J. Crew and Buckle.

RadioShack warns of possible Chapter 11 bankruptcy

NEW YORK (AP) — RadioShack warned Thursday that it may need to file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy reorganization if it can't rework its debt or find another way to ease a cash crunch.

The struggling retailer said in a regulatory filing that it is in talks with its lenders, bondholders, shareholders and landlords to fix its balance sheet, but if it can't, it will try to file a prepackaged bankruptcy.

We need help with our budget!

Dear Dave,
My husband and I have been living on a budget for a few months, and for some reason there seems to be leaks in our budget. It's just a few dollars here and there, but added together it makes a huge dent. Can you give us some advice?

Dear Joy,
This kind of thing happens a lot in household budgeting, especially to folks who are new to the game. Here are some ideas to help stretch your dollars and plug those leaks.

Use the cash-only method, especially when shopping for groceries. Take only the amount you have budgeted, and don't use your debit card or a check. Also, use coupons only for items you would buy anyway. In addition, you can stock up on items you use often when there is a big sale. These little things will add up.

Try eating out only on special occasions, drink water as your beverage and don't be

afraid to use coupons in restaurants, either. When it comes to buying clothes, make a habit of checking out the sale rack first. You can shop at thrift and consignment stores, and sell the clothes you don't wear anymore.

With entertainment, use dollar-off and buy-one-get-one-free coupons whenever you can. See a matinee or a second-run movie, and if you're going somewhere with a bunch of people, call ahead and ask for a group discount. You'll be amazed at how much money these tactics will save!

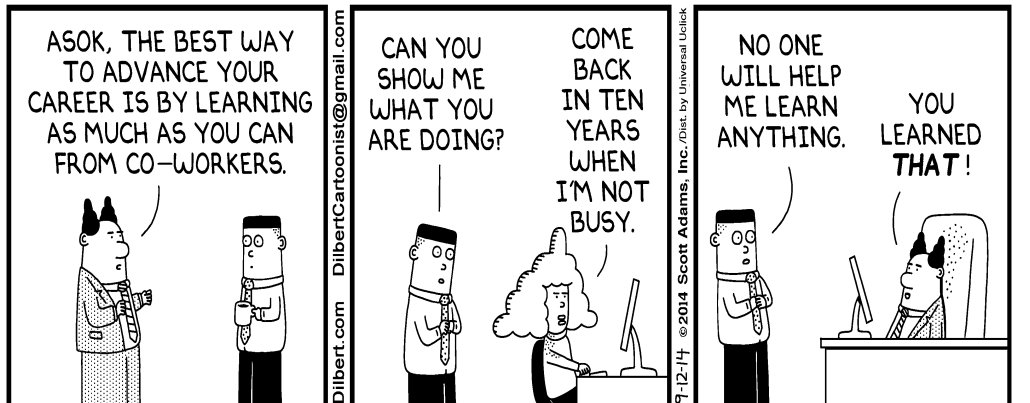
use to avoid paying all this interest?

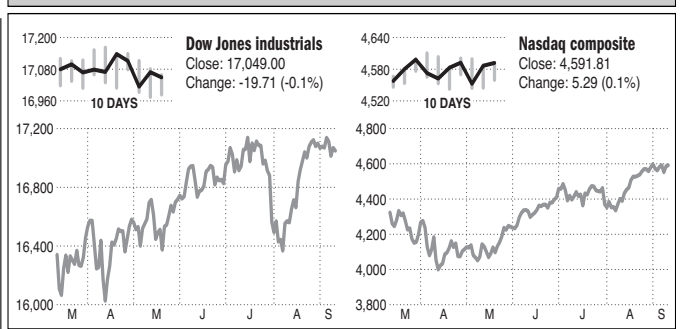
