

OUR AUTHORS AND PRESENTERS



DICK GODFREY HARRY ADAMS

Born in 1951 in Launceston. Dick attended school in northern Tasmania, but only learned to read and write when he became employed after leaving school. Consequently Dick has had a lifelong interest in adult literacy and is a Life Member of the Adult Literacy Council. Dick was elected to both State and Federal Parliament finishing in 2013. One of his many committees included the Parliamentary Library Joint Committee and from that he was elected to the National Library Board. On leaving Federal Parliament, Dick was elected to his local council, the Northern Midlands Council in Tasmania. Dick has always been active in helping others with literacy and is well known in Tasmania for his advocacy for adult learners (as well as his enormous enjoyment of cooking and presenting Tasmanian produce). Dick was a National Ambassador of the National Year of Reading for 2012. In 2016 he was appointed to the State Library Board by the Local Government Association of Tasmania.



PHILLIP ADAMS

Ever exuberant, ever the challenger of the status quo. Phillip has been at the forefront of Australia's creative life for decades. He is one of Australia's 100 Living National Treasures, has been showered with awards for his work in film, advertising. television, radio and is an author of more than 20 books. Retirement is not in his DNA as he farms, talks and writes, latterly as host of Radio National's Late Night Live and in his weekly column in the Weekend Australian Magazine where he is installed at the back so he can always have the last word



DR KEITH ADKINS

Keith is a sixth-generation
Tasmanian who lives and works in Launceston where he is self-employed in the conservation of books and manuscripts.
He is a professional member of the Australian Institute for the Conservation of Cultural Materials. He graduated with a PhD from the University of Tasmania in 2004, and is the author of Reading in Colonial Tasmania: The Early Years of the

Evandale Subscription Library, published in 2010.



DR ALISON ALEXANDER

With Tasmania's convict history as one of the key festival themes, Dr Alison Alexander brings a vast knowledge and a national reputation on the subject to the marquee sessions. She is a seventh-generation Australian, with convict ancestors in the first, second and third fleet. She has worked as a freelance historian and as a lecturer and tutor in history at the University of Tasmania. Alison is editor of the Companion to Tasmanian History and has written 17 commissioned histories of Tasmanian institutions. She has also written biographies of authors Mary Grant Bruce and Marie Bjelke-Petersen, and a combined biography of governors' wives and mistresses in early Van Diemen's Land. She won last year's \$25,000 National Biography award for her biography of Lady Jane Franklin.



KATHRYN APEL

Kathryn is a born-and-bred farm girl and lives with her husband

and two sons amongst the gum trees, cattle and kangaroos on a Queensland grazing property. Kathryn teaches part-time in the role of literacy coordinator, and conducts author talks at schools and festivals. She writes poetry, picture books and verse novels for children. Kathrvn's most recent book is On Track (2015).



MARILYN ARNOLD

Marilyn is a published Tasmanian writer and poet. She has been writing for over thirty years. She was inaugural president of the Society of Women Writers Tasmanian Branch, and has long been associated with the Fellowship of Australian Writers, Tasmania, Marilyn also shares the running of the monthly open mic readings in Launceston, Poetry Pedlars, which she costarted over twenty years ago. Marilyn participates regularly in poetry readings throughout Tasmania, and has been a guest reader at two Tasmanian Poetry Festivals. In 2014 she won the annual Launceston Poetry Cup. She also runs a fortnightly poetry workshop in Launceston, has taught life-writing classes and writing as therapy.



ROBBIE ARNOTT

Robbie is a Tasmanian writer whose work focuses on masculinity, family, sport and the occasional marsupial. His writing has been published in Island, Kill Your Darlings, the Review of Australian Fiction, Seizure, and many other publications. In 2014 he won the Scribe Nonfiction Prize for Young Writers, and in 2015 he won the Tasmanian Young Writer's Fellowship as part of the Premier's Literary Prizes. He spends a lot of time running, playing cricket, annoying his siblings and standing in the supermarket trying to remember what his girlfriend asked him to buy.



GARRY BAILEY

Garry is a journalist with more than 45 years experience and a foundation member of the festival committee. He was editor for more than 10 years of The Mercury and The Sunday Tasmanian, the state's two biggest selling newspapers. Garry is now a media and communications consultant and an adviser to Bicycle Network, Australia's biggest cycling organisation.



STEWART BELL

Stewart is a Launceston based comedian and MC. He has hosted a variety of comedy evenings, fundraisers and events around Tasmania. He was the co-founder of Uber Comedy in Launceston and now produces and hosts Fresh Comedy - a monthly show that showcases some of the Nation's finest comedians in a gorgeously intimate setting at Fresh Café in Launceston. He was a state finalist in the National RAW Comedy competition and has performed with some of the biggest names in Australian comedy, including Greg Fleet, Tom Ballard and the Axis of Awesome. In 2014 he performed his debut full-length solo show, Furry Friends to a sell-out crowd at Fresh Café. He has also performed at the Melbourne International Comedy Festival in 2014 and 2015 as part of the Heads a Plenty Tasmanian Comedy showcase. In his spare time he enjoys writing power ballads for Daryl Braithwaite, training Mexican walking fish to do hand stands, and making up ridiculous, entirely fabricated facts to end his bio with.





EMILY BITTO

Emily has a Masters in Literary Studies and a PhD in Creative Writing from the University of Melbourne, where she is also a sessional teacher and supervisor in the creative writing program. The manuscript of her debut novel, *The Strays*, was shortlisted for the 2013 Victorian Premier's Literary Award for an Unpublished Manuscript, and was the 2015 winner of the Stella Prize.



DR BOB BROWN

Dr Bob Brown led the campaign (1978-83) to save Tasmania's wild Franklin River from dams and the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area is now a cornerstone of the island's booming tourism sector and employment growth. He led the Tasmanian Greens in the state parliament 1983-93 and the Australian Greens in the federal parliament 1996-2012. His books include Lake Pedder. Tarkine Trails Memo for a Saner World, Earth, Optimism and Green Nomads. A first draft of his novella *Thera* is complete.



S.J. BROWN

S.J. Brown is the pen-name of Tasmanian author Stephen Brown. A semi-retired teacher of literature and sport, he now devotes the greater part of his energies to the Detective Inspector Mahoney series, which is set in Tasmania.



HILARY BURDEN

Hilary is a writer, TasWeekend columnist, and occasional ABC broadcaster based in Stoney Creek Nation, an area between the Tamar Valley and Pipers River Valley in northern Tasmania. Her memoir. A Story of Seven Summers: Life In The Nuns' House, was published by Allen & Unwin in September 2012. She has worked in London and Sydney for some of the world's leading newspapers and magazines. While working on her next book she contributes to Country Style magazine and Guardian Australia.



JULIAN BURNSIDE

Julian was one of the stars of the 2014 festival and returns to inform, entertain and provoke. The Queen's Counsel and human rights and refugee activist is one of Australia's best-known legal figures. Last year he won the Sydney Peace Prize, largely for his pro bono work with asylum seekers. In 2004 he was designated a National Living Treasure.



PATSY CAMERON

Patsy grew up on Flinders Island and can trace her Tasmanian Aboriginal heritage through her mother's line to four ancestral grandmothers: Pleenpereener, Wyerlooberer and Teekoolterme from the northeast Coastal Plains nation and Pollerelbener from the east coast Oyster Bay nation. At the head of her family is Teekoolterme's father, the revered Pairrebeener clansman and formidable warrior leader, Mannalargenna.

In recognition of over three decades of dedicated work in Aboriginal education, community affairs and cultural heritage Patsy was inducted onto the Tasmanian Women's Honour roll in 2006. She has a Bachelor of Arts degree majoring in Archaeology and

Geography, and a Master of Art's in Tasmanian Aboriginal History. Her thought provoking book Grease and Ochre: The blending of two cultures at the colonial sea frontier was published in 2011. Patsy continues her passion as a cultural heritage practitioner weaving traditional baskets, creating shell necklaces, working with kelp and whittling wooden implements. She facilitates cultural integrity workshops, conducts interpretive walks on Country, undertakes Aboriginal research field trips, represents and reflects community views and on request returns to teaching programs and cultural activity workshops at Riawunna Centre for Aboriginal Education, University of Tasmania.



TINO CARNEVALE

Tino's lifelong interest in plants and gardening stems from growing up on his family's small vineyard and olive grove in southern Tasmania. He studied landscape design at Royal Melbourne Institue of Technology and has an Associate Diploma in Horticulture. As well as being a presenter on Gardening Australia, Tino writes for newspapers, magazines and gardening websites and is frequently heard on ABC radio giving gardening advice. He has worked with the Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens developing the Patch and helping to ensure it continues to provide fresh produce to Secondbite. a charity organisation that

collects and redistributes food to the needy. He spent four years working as part of The Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program with students at Moonah Primary School and teaches gardening skills to adults and children in garden clubs, schools and refugee groups and disability services. Tino is a patron of the Tasmanian Weed Society, an organisation that raises awareness of environmental weeds and their impact. He is the reciient of the 2011 Anita Boucher Young Achievers Award prsented by the Horticultural Media Association.



MICHAEL CATHCART

Michael is the presenter of Radio National's Books & Arts program and he has also presented Arts Today and the Radio National Quiz. For ABC TV he has presented the history magazine show Rewind and the documentary series Roque Nation. Cathcart is the author of Defending the National Tuckshop (1988), an expose of a secret militia called the White Army formed in Victoria in 1931, and he has published an abridgement of Manning Clark's epic A History of Australia and an anthology of Australian speeches. He currently serves as the spokesperson for the Tasmanian Gay and Lesbian Rights Group, National Convenor of Australian Marriage Equality and one of the founders of the Australian Coalition for Equality (ACE). Rodney grew up on a dairy farm in Tasmania's North West and studied European History at the University of Tasmania, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts in 1988. Rodney's latest book From this day forward: marriage equality in Australia was published by Walleah Press in 2015.



PETER CUNDALL

Campaigner, raconteur,
Tasmanian Living Treasure and,
of course, a Tamar Valley local.
But, first of all a man who loves
growing things and teaching

Other series include Mission Fox and Lost World Circus. Justin's latest book is Cooper, part of Penguin Publishers' Stuff Happens series for boys.



CLAIRE DUNN

Claire is a journalist, rewilding facilitator, barefoot explorer, and author of the best selling My Year With Matches: Escaping the City in Search of the Wild. She left her high-pressured job as an environmental campaigner, her partner and busy city life behind, and embarked on a journey of self-discovery and healing while learning wilderness survival skills during a year in the bush. The book is the story of that journey.



RACHEL EDWARDS

Rachel Edwards is the editor in chief of Transportation Press, whose second book, The Third Script: new short stories from Iran, Tasmania and the UK will be launched in 2016. She is a regular guest on ABC radio discussing books and publishing and was host of the long running Book Show on Edge Radio. She is a freelance writer and reviewer and is former editor of Island and judge of the Tasmanian Literary Prizes.



JIM EVERETT

Born on Flinders Island. Tasmania in 1942, Jim left primary school at age 14 to begin work. His background includes 15 years at sea, 3 years in the Australian Army and over 30 years formal involvement in the Aboriginal struggle. His written works include plays, political papers, short stories, and writings published in 10 major anthologies. Jim's other work includes television documentaries and theatre production. He lives on Cape Barren Island often working away from home on various cultural arts programs. He is currently developing ongoing projects with Kick Start Arts in Hobart, was a writer-inresidence in Wollongong in November and is finishing a novel.



THE HON TIMOTHY ANDREW FISCHER AC

Tim Fischer was born at Lockhart, NSW, and educated at Boree Creek in the Riverina, NSW and Xavier College. Melbourne. Mr Fischer served with the Australian Army in Australia and Vietnam, before returning to the family farm at Boree Creek, From 1971 to 1984 he served in the NSW Parliament As Federal Member for Farrer from 1984 to 2001 he ultimately became Leader of the National Party and later Minister for Trade and Deputy Prime Minister in the Howard Government (1996-1999). He led the official delegation to observe the East Timor referendum in 1999.In Parliament, Tim Fischer strongly supported gun law reform and the world's newest transcontinental railway. Adelaide to Darwin. Since he retired from politics in 2001, he has served as Chair Tourism Australia. Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, Special Envoy to Bhutan, Eritrea and South Sudan. He has visited over 84 countries In 2012 Tim Fischer was elected Vice Chairman of the Global Crop Diversity Trust or GCDT with Seed Vault in North Norway. Currently Mr Fischer has a range of business interests, mainly with an export orientation. His hobbies include chess and trekking in

Bhutan and bushwalking near Tumbarumba, drinking white wine and reading old railway books. Mr Fischer has also held many honorary postions related to agriculture and charities. Tim is the author of: Seven Days in East Timor: Outback Heroes & Communities that Count (co author); Transcontinental Train Odyssey: The Ghan, The Khyber, The Globe: Bold Bhutan Beckons (Co Author with Tshering Tashi): Trains Unlimited in the 21st Century; Holy See, Unholy me: 1000 Davs in Rome and Maestro John Monash: Australia's greatest Citizen General.



RICHARD FIDLER

Richard is the host of Conversations with Richard Fidler, an in-depth, up-closeand-personal interview program, broadcast across Australia on ABC Local Radio and Radio National, and internationally on Radio Australia. Conversations is also the ABC's most popular podcast. Listeners from all over the world download over 1.5 million individual episodes every month. In his pre-radio years. Richard's life was in comedy. At university in Canberra, he formed a busking group with Tim Ferguson and Paul McDermott for beer money. This side project mutated into the monstrously confrontational music/comedy group The Doug Anthony Allstars (DAAS). After ten huge years the group imploded, and Richard was asked to present the documentary TV series Race Around the World. In 2005

Richard joined ABC Radio and instantly wished he'd done it much earlier in his life. He loves the richness and intimacy of radio and likes its evolution into the podcast even more. He began hosting Conversations in 2006. Richard is very thankful to be given a program where he can grab people off the street and ask them impertinent questions. He will continue to follow orders from his producers and he hopes to see his wife and kids again sometime soon.



BRENDAN FITZGERALD

Brendan is the Digital Inclusion Manager for the Melbourne based Not for Profit social enterprise Infoxchange where he leads a number of programs including Australia's first national digital literacy program Go Digi (www.godi. org.au). Initially elected to the Tasmanian Parliament in 1996, at the age of 23, Lara was the youngest woman ever elected to an Australian Parliament, As a Minister across various portfolios, she drove reform in Health, Disabilities, Children, Housing and the law, as well as focussing the Tasmanian economy towards the opportunities that lay in the Asian Century, particularly in China and Indonesia I ara has always had a strong sense of social justice and has advocated for equality for woman, the right of woman to make decision about their own bodies and against violence against women.



ERIN GOUGH

Erin is a fiction writer whose award-winning short stories have been published in a number of journals and anthologies including Best Australian Stories, Overland, Southerly and Going Down Swinging. Her novel for young adults, The Flywheel, won the Ampersand Prize and was published by Hardie Grant Egmont in 2015.



POSIE GRAEME-EVANS

Posie is an Australian novelist, television and film producer, editor, screenwriter and director, best known for her children's programs and adult dramas. She has created many commercially successful and award-winning programs throughout her career, but she is best known as creator of *McLeod's Daughters* which during its 2001-2008 run won 8 Logies and Hi-5, which has won three Logies and five ARIA awards. She was also Director

of Drama for the Nine Network from 2002-2005 and has written five historical dramas.



GIDEON HAIGH

Gideon is the author of 30 books, 20 of them about cricket, including the acclaimed portrait of Shane Warne, On Warne. This vear he has turned his hand to true crime and he has written extensively about business and journalism. Haigh won the John Curtin Prize for Journalism in the Victorian Premier's Literary Awards in 2006 for his essay Information Idol: How Google is Making Us Stupid, which was published in The Monthly magazine. His book, The Office won the NSW Premier's Literary Awards Douglas Stewart Prize for Non-fiction. Ever the allrounder, he also penned End of the Road? on Australia's automotive industry, and The Deserted Newsroom, about media in a digital age.



LESLEY HARRISON

Lesley is a retired academic from the University of Tasmania where she taught for twenty years. She received the only Teacher Excellence award given in 1998 from the Vice-Chancellor. She holds a

Doctor of Philosophy. Lesley is a member of the Tasmanian Writers Centre and is an accomplished writer of short storys, several of which have been published. She is currently submitting her novel titled Behind the Boomgate to several publishers. Her interest in the writing festival stems as a member of the committee of the inaugural Festival of Golden Words in 2014.



STEVE HARRIS

Steve Harris is a fourthgeneration Tasmanian, Recent research into his own family history, which includes convicts, policemen and settlers, re-ignited a broad interest in aspects of Australia's national story largely forgotten or untold. History Group, which compiled the well-received *Down Wapping* (1988), a social history of the vanished Hobart waterfront district. *Down Wapping* was published by Blubber Head Press, founded by Dan Sprod and now conducted by Michael, which has since 1979 published over 30 titles, largely on Tasmanian history, often in fine limited editions.



TIM THORNE

Tim Thorne is the author of fourteen volumes of poetry, the most recent being The Unspeak Poems and other verses (Walleah Press) in 2014. He inaugurated the Tasmanian Poetry Festival, which he directed from 1985 to 2001. Thorne has been writerinresidence with a number of institution and organisations, including the Miscellaneous Workers Union and the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery, and has worked as a poet in schools, universities and prisons. He was a national finalist in the Poetry Slam in 2009 and 2010. He was awarded the Stanford Writing Scholarship, 1971; New Poetry Award, 1973; Marten Beguest Travelling Scholarship for poetry, 1978: the Gleebooks Poetry Sprint, 1995; the Launceston Poetry Cup, 2006 & 2008; the William Baylebridge Award, 2007; the Christopher Brennan Award. 2012 and the Gwen Harwood Poetry Prize, 2014. He has also received support from the Australia Council, Arts Tasmania and the Fleanor Dark Foundation.

Clive has been a bookseller since he left school.



LINDSAY TUFFIN

After a long career in newspapers as a reporter, sub-editor and senior editor, the always colourful and entertaining Lindsay Tuffin quit the game in 2003 to embrace the then brave new world of online media. The result: the website *Tasmaniantimes.com* which has survived and prospered with its robust mix of commentary and investigating reporting. Lindsay was named Tasmanian Journalist of the Year in 2004 for his pathfinding work, all on a shoestring budget.



ELLEN VAN NEERVEN

Ellen van Neerven is an awardwinning Brisbane-based writer. Her first book, *Heat and Light* (UQP 2014), was the recipient of the David Unaipon Award and shortlisted for The Stella Prize, the NSW Premier's

Literary Awards, and the Dobbie Literary Award. Ellen's writing has appeared in publications such as McSweenev's. Review of Australian Fiction. The Lifted Brow, Meanjin, Ora Nui and Mascara Literary Review. Ellen works at the State Library of Queensland as part of the black&write! indigenous writing and editing project which aims to support and promote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander writers. Ellen is the editor of the digital collection Writing Black: New Indigenous Writing from Australia.



HER EXCELLENCY PROFESSOR THE HONOURABLE KATE WARNER AM, GOVERNOR OF TASMANIA

Tasmania's 28th Governor, was sworn to Office 10 December 2014. Previously she was Professor, Faculty of Law, at the University of Tasmania and Director of the Tasmanian Law Reform Institute, On 26 January 2014 Her Excellency was awarded an Order of Australia (AM) for her significant service to the law, particularly in the areas of law reform and education. In addition to working with the Tasmania Law Reform Institute on its projects, she had been involved in providing advice and submissions on rape law reform, drug diversion and mental health diversion programs and abortion law reform. She also assisted other law reform bodies nationally. She was a Commissioner of the Tasmanian Gaming Commission, with a particular interest in

regulation, gaming policy and harm minimisation, a Member of the Sentencing Advisory Council since 2010 and of the Board of Legal Education. As President of the Alcorso Foundation, Her Excellency supports social and cultural advancement in the community through its programs in the Arts, Environment and Social Justice. She has published numerous journal articles, book chapters and law reform reports. She first published Sentencing in Tasmania in 1991, which has since become an indispensable tool for judges and magistrates. She is a member of the editorial boards of Current Issues in Criminal Justice; Women Against Violence; and the Criminal Law Journal. She has contributed the annual Sentencing Review to the Criminal Law Journal since 1998. She has written a number of papers for the Tasmanian Law Reform Institute.



DON WATSON

In an extraordinary diverse career with words, Don Watson has spanned politics, speech-writing, history, film, biography and travel and of course his heroic attack on the rise of weasel words in public life and how we should all strive to write and speak more plainly and rid the nation of jargon. Recollections of a Bleeding Heart: A Portrait of Paul Keating PM. won both The Age Book of the Year and non-fiction prizes, the Brisbane Courier Mail Book of the Year, the National Biography Award and the Australian Literary Studies Association's Book of the

Year. In addition to regular books, articles and essays, in recent years he has also written feature films, including The Man Who Sued God, starring Billy Connolly and Judy Davis, and Passion, a film about Percy Grainger. His 2001 Quarterly Essay Rabbit Syndrome: Australia and America won the inaugural Alfred Deakin Prize in the Victorian Premier's Literary Awards. Death Sentence. his book about the decay of public language, was also a best seller and won the Australian Booksellers Association Book of the Year.
