The institute provides funding support for research into the relationship between diet, nutrition, physical activity, and cancer, and seeks to expand consumer knowledge about the results of such research as it relates to cancer prevention and treatment in the U.S. and worldwide.

Program Area(s)

The grantmaker has identified the following area(s) of interest:

Investigator-Initiated Grants (IIG)

This program provides \$75,000 per year for two years, plus 10 percent of indirect costs, to encourage research on the dietary and nutritional means of preventing and treating cancer. Relevant applications must focus on dietary factors in the treatment and/or prevention of cancer.

Marilyn Gentry Fellowship Program in Nutrition and Cancer

These two-year, \$100,000 fellowships are designed to develop leaders in cutting-edge nutritional research as it relates to cancer prevention, treatment, and survivorship. Fellows will be paired with a research mentor who will help the fellow identify a subset of the mentor's research to be set aside for the fellow. Fellows will be appointed at the rank of research Assistant Professor of Nutrition and will receive two years of organized mentoring on the specific skills needed to succeed as academic scientists; fellows will also develop a body of data that will allow them to compete successfully for grant funding and help establish them as independent investigators. Eligible applicants must have completed at least one year of postdoctoral training with intended research focus in nutrition and cancer prevention and treatment.

Matching Grants

These grants, in coordination with industry or individuals, fund research projects in the area of diet, nutrition, and cancer prevention and treatment. Applications should follow the guidelines and application procedures for Investigator-Initiated Grants.

Post-Doctoral Grant Awards (PDA)

This program provides \$25,000 per year for two years, plus 10 percent of indirect costs, to beginning investigators to support innovative research on the prevention, etiology, and treatment of cancer by dietary or nutritional methods. Applications should propose relevant feasibility studies to obtain data in support of a new hypothesis that then could be expanded to increase understanding of the role of dietary and nutritional factors in the etiology, pathogenesis, prevention, or treatment of cancer. The principal investigator must have a Ph.D. or equivalent degree or M.D. degree that was awarded no more than three years prior to the date of application, and must hold an academic appointment no higher than assistant professor. The applicant must be sponsored by a professor in whose laboratory the applicant is to perform the research.

Background

Incorporated in 1930 in MI.

Founded in 1930 as an independent, private foundation by breakfast cereal pioneer, Will Keith Kellogg, the W.K. Kellogg Foundation (WKKF) is among the largest philanthropic foundations in the United States. Guided by the belief that all children should have an equal opportunity to thrive, WKKF works with communities to create conditions for vulnerable children so they can realize their full potential in school, work and life. The Kellogg Foundation is based in Battle Creek, Mich., and works throughout the United States and internationally, as well as with sovereign tribes. Special emphasis is paid to priority places where there are high concentrations of poverty and where children face significant barriers to success. WKKF priority places in the U.S. are in Michigan, Mississippi, New Mexico and New Orleans; and internationally, are in Mexico and Haiti. The grantmaker is a signatory to Philanthropy's Promise, an initiative of the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy (NCRP). By signing on, the grantmaker has committed to allocating the majority of its grantmaking dollars to marginalized communities and at least 25 percent to social justice strategies, such as advocacy, community organizing, and civic engagement.

Limitations

Purpose and Activities

The W.K. Kellogg Foundation supports children, families, and communities as they strengthen and create conditions that propel vulnerable children to achieve success as individuals and as contributors to the larger community and society. The foundation's work is carried out by partners and programs that help it achieve its three organizational goals and embody its commitments to community and civic engagement, and to racial equity. The three goals are: 1) Educated Kids: Success by third grade. Increase the number of children who are reading-and-math proficient by third grade; 2) Healthy Kids: Healthy birth weight and optimal development. Increase the number of children born at a healthy birth weight and who receive the care and healthy food they need for optimal development; and 3) Secure Families: Children and families at 200 percent above poverty. Increase the number of children and families living at least 200 percent above the poverty level.

Community and Civic Engagement

The foundation believes that people have an inherent capacity to solve their own problems and that social transformation is within reach for all communities. The foundation partners with those committed to increasing public and community participation in improving the lives of vulnerable children, families and communities. The foundation amplifies voices by supporting dialogue, leadership development and new models of organizing. It seeks to accelerate philanthropy that grows giving and promotes community-led innovation. And, WKKF is committed to help build a stronger, more effective and responsive nonprofit sector.

Community Leadership Network Fellowship

The fellowship targets individuals who can be transformative social change agents in their communities so that vulnerable children and their families can achieve optimal health and well-being, academic achievement and financial security. Embedded in this effort are the foundation's two approaches to all its work: community and civic engagement and racial equity and healing. Selected fellow will spend three years honing leadership skills and sharing their experiences with a cohort of developing leaders. A total of 100 fellows will be equitably selected from the foundation's U.S. priority places - Michigan, Mississippi, New Mexico and New Orleans - and will do their work from there. Another 20 fellows will be selected to function as a national cohort whose work will focus on racial healing and equity.

Education and Learning

All children need the support of parents, caretakers and the community to ensure their optimal development for success in school, work and life. WKKF partners with organizations focused on early childhood education to ensure that children arrive prepared and ready to learn in kindergarten and to achieve early success by the third grade. This work is accomplished through parental and family engagement; effective teaching; comprehensive bundled services where programs, practices, policies, partners, networks and systems are aligned to ensure effectiveness; and efforts to achieve racial equity in education and learning.

Employee Matching Gifts

The foundation matches gifts of all full-time employees, officers, trustees, and retired employees to eligible organizations having status as a public institution under Section 501(c)(3) and 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code and foreign charitable organizations determined equivalent to a U.S. Section 501(c)(3) and 509(a) organization. This includes schools, government units, hospital or medical research facilities, religious organizations, and public-supported charities. Only direct gifts of cash or marketable securities to the charity by an eligible donor will be matched. The minimum gift is \$25 and the maximum is \$100,000 per eligible donor per calendar year. The maximum total corporate payout per employee, per year is \$200,000. Gifts are matched on a two-to-one ratio. Contributions by the foundation may not be used to provide personal benefits to, or to discharge a pledge or other legal obligation of, the donor. Similarly, contributions by a donor that provide personal benefits to the donor or other person such as payments of tuition, membership dues, subscriptions, and other similar fees, are not eligible for matching grants by the foundation.

Family Economic Security

The foundation works to ensure that all families have opportunities to achieve economic security and provide stable environments for their children's optimal development. The foundation supports organizations and programs that: increase families' capability to accumulate and more effectively manage financial resources; align and strengthen industry employer training partnerships to create more quality jobs; and strengthen and integrate whole child and family support systems. The foundation recognizes that a family's primary needs must be addressed to create pathways out of poverty for children and support efforts that reduce inequities based on class, gender and race.

Food, Health and Well-Being

All children deserve good food, stimulation, nurturing and safe living environments and access to quality health care. The foundation helps children get a healthy start by supporting partners that: work to support mothers' and families' health throughout their lives; improve access to perinatal care systems and increase breastfeeding rates; and transform food systems so children and families gain more access to healthy foods in child care settings, schools and in their communities. Through grantmaking, policy and advocacy efforts, the foundation's focus is on the interrelated social determinants of health, especially for those disadvantaged by multiple societal factors, a disproportionate percentage of whom are children of color.

Awards of Excellence

These awards recognize individual efforts that have improved children's lives. The achievements of a physician who has made an outstanding contribution in the field of health care, and those of an individual who has done the same for the general well-being of children, are honored with a \$100,000 grant to be given to the nonprofit children's organization identified by the

recipient.

Grants

These grants focus on sustainable, replicable projects that include a train-the-trainer component in their pursuit of addressing the most pressing issues relating to children's health and well being. Grants will be awarded to stable, efficient U.S based organizations operating internationally or domestically with proven outcomes and strong partnerships with key stakeholders. Consideration will be given to organizations whose project methodology involves a comprehensive, ethnographic approach to their research, program development, program implementation, and evaluation.

Ronald McDonald Care Mobile Program

The program maintains a fleet of state-of-the-art vehicles that deliver cost-effective medical, dental, and education services directly to underserved children in their own neighborhoods. The vehicles are equipped with telemedicine capabilities that can transmit images and provide remote consultations, video conferencing, and medical/surgical follow-up. The vehicle accommodates two patient examination rooms, a laboratory, and a pharmacy. The mobile provides a number of medical and dental services, including primary care, specialty care, blood collection, diagnosis, treatment, referral, follow-up for serious medical conditions, health education, and federally-assisted health insurance program enrollment.

Ronald McDonald Family Room Program

These rooms provide a haven within the hospital for the families of children undergoing treatment. The family room serves as a place of respite for family members to step away from the stressful hospital environment. Designed to reflect a comfortable environment, many families use the family room to rest and reflect.

Ronald McDonald House Program

This program provides a 'home away from home' for families of seriously ill children receiving treatment at nearby hospitals. The house provides a comfortable, supportive lodging alternative for these families. It serves as a temporary residence near the medical facility where family members can sleep, eat, relax and find support from other families in similar situations. In return, families are asked to make a donation ranging on average from \$5 to \$20 per day, but if that isn't possible, their stay is free.

Scholarships

Scholarships to high school seniors who have demonstrated academic achievement, leadership, and community involvement. Eligible applicants must: live in an area where there is a participating local organization chapter; be younger than 21 years old; be eligible to attend a two- or four-year college or university with a full course of study; and be a legal U.S. resident. Scholarships are available through one of four channels: RMHC Scholars, RMHC/ASIA (Asian Students Increasing Achievement), RMHC/African-American Future Achievers, and RMHC/HACER.

Burst Project Grants

These one-time grants, of up to \$5,000, are available to human-care ministry projects designed and led by young adult leaders in the Lutheran community. In addition to the grant, participants will: receive professional consultation and feedback from ministry staff to assist in implementing an innovative and feasible project; be connected with a ministry mentor, when possible, to help guide the project; participate in a gathering of other project leaders, hosted by the ministry; and be promoted within the ministry community.

Congregation Health Ministry (CHM) Grant Program

These one-year grants of \$2,000 each are available to help ministry leaders move inspired whole-person health-and-wellness ideas into action within congregations. Grants are open to Lutheran congregations committed to becoming centers of health and hope in their community; priority will be given to quality proposals focusing on ministry to returning military and their families.

GrantsPlus Program Grants

These grants, ranging from \$5,000 to \$50,000 over a period of two to three years, are available to support new and innovative health and human care programs led by congregations and nonprofit organizations affiliated with the Lutheran community. Participants will be expected to participate in capacity-building activities offered by the ministry during the term of the grant, including webinars, convening events, workshops, or consultations.

Joshua Grants

Matching grants of up to \$10,000, payable over two years, are available to health and human care projects within the Chicago metropolitan area that are new and innovative.

Ministry Sabbatical Grant Program

Matching grants of up to \$7,500 are available to Lutheran congregations and clergy who are planning their first sabbatical experience (intended to support the whole person health of the ministry leader and congregation). Funds may be used to cover salary and benefits for additional staff, expenses related to the work of an interim staff member, and travel/education expenses for the sabbatical experience.
