Indianapolis-The 1993 U.S.
Senior National Judo
Championships were held at
the Indiana Convention
Center in Indianapolis on
April 16 through 17th. A total
of 367 competitors competed
in 16 weight divisions and a
Masters division for National
titles. Despite the fact that the
American World
Championship trials were

completed in March, several U.S. World team members competed here, most of them in higher weight classes. Jason Morris, -78kg. World team member, competed at -86kg, and defeated junior national champion Brian Olsen (CO) for the title. -65kg. World team member James Pedro took the -71kg. title in a controversial decision match against C. Mendez of San Jose State University. In the women's classes, veteran and former World contender Lynn Roethke (WI) captured the

• MEN -86kg: Dead Heat The 86kg category will be tough to predict this year. With many new up and coming players appearing it should be an exciting competition.

The 1991 World Champion Hirotaka Okada (JPN) is past his prime and is no longer strong enough to hold back the rush of new talent in his homeland, so he will more than likely not make Japan's World Team. 1991 World 2nd, Joe Wanag of the United

States did not compete at U.S. trials and will not appear this year. The status of '91 World 3rd and '92 Olympic Gold medalist, Waldemar Legien (POL) is not know. He could appear, but considering his age and the fact that

he has won just about every title, he could have turned in for retirement. Among the potential winners, four stand out as the front runners.

Nicholas Gill (Canada)

Finished 3rd at last year's Olympics and second at the tough Kano Cup, he is young (21yrs.) and strong, combined with a "home mat" advantage Gill has a slight edge over the other competitors.

• Pascal Tayot (FRA)

After last year's frustrating 2nd place finish at the Barcelona Olympics, Tayot is hungary to win and will settle for nothing less than a World Title. With exception to Nakamura (JPN), if he can get his opponents into newaza he will be hard to stop.

• Axel Lobenstien (GER)

The 1991 European Champion made it to the semifinals at the '92 Olympics, but lost to Tayot (FRA). In the battle for the bronze he lost by decision to Okada (JPN). With most of the players who have plagued him in the past absent, he should do well.

Yoshio Nakamura (JPN)

Presently the front runner for Japan's -86kg spot. Nakamura won the first of two world trials, winning the Kodokan Cup victory over Hirotaka Okada in April. If he can win at the

second trial and stay injury free he will have a chance to finish first or second at the Worlds.

Masaru Tanabe (JPN)
 3rd '92 Kano Cup, 1st '93 German

Open Tanabe of Nittai University will eventually become Japan's top -86kg player. Victories over some of the world's top players, including N.Gill (CAN) at the '92 Junior World Championships, easily ranks Tanabe among the top five -86kg players in the World. If he beats out fellow countryman Nakamura for Japan's -86kg spot for the Worlds Tanabe will medal.

Women's -66kg.

• Odalys Reve (CUB)

Cuban Odalys Reve has been the premire power in this division. Over the last two years she has won every major title, but one the "World Championship." With a strong win at the '93 French Int'nl, Reve hasn't shown any sign of slowing down, unless she gets injuried she is the odds-on favorite. '91 World Champion Emanuel Pierantozzi (ITA) religated Reve

to second place at the Worlds in 1991. At the Barcelona Olympics the roles were reversed and Reve captured the Gold. At 24 years old, Pierantozzi still has it in her to seriously challenge Reve. Great Britain's Kate Howey along with Belgium's Heidi Rakels finished with bronze medals at the '92 Olympics. Both with strong performances could medal at this year's Worlds. USA's Liliko Ogasawara has a good chance to finish third, but it will be tough!

Tokyo, Japan - 1993 Kodokan Cup Championships was held at the Tokyo Metropolitan Police Martial Arts Hall on April 4th. This annual event is the first of two trials for the selection of members for Japan's World team. The final trial for men will be held on June 13 and the women on July 11 in Fukuoka, Kyushu.

With many top players missing from this event it is still too early to predict who will represent Japan at the World. Championships. To make things more difficult, the top players who did attend, four '92 Barcelona Olympic

competitors, were defeated. In the -60kg division, '92 Olympic Bronze medalist and '91 World Champion T.Koshino finished third after being upset by Kenichi Harada (Kashiya

World 2nd) by Osotogari for Ippon. Two time world champion Hirotaka Okada lost by decision to Yoshio Nakamura ('93 FRA Int'nl 2nd) in the -86kg division. The end of this match was interesting. Nakamura was strangling Okada with Okuri-eri-jime, Okada refused to yield, when regulation time was over Nakamura got up. but Okada didn't....he was unconscious. Another Olympic contender Yasuhiro Kai (Nippon Steel) lost by decision to teammate Shigeru Okaizumi in the -95kg division. In the absence of Toshihiko Koga, who is taking a whole year off from Judo, the -71kg division was won by Kenzo Nakamura (Tokai Univ.), the younger brother of Yoshio Nakamura, defeating '92 Kano Cup 2nd Hideyuki Sakai (JGSDF). The -78kg title went to Yoshiyuki Takanami ('92 Kano 2nd) and the +95kg went to the veteran Hideyuki Sekine (Maruchan).

British Coaches Leave Amid Controversy

London, Great Britain - After the 1992 Olympics a series of accusations, rumors, claims, and counter claims resulted in the departure of two team managers and two coaches.

Roy Inman, women's team manager has resigned after 15 years in that position. He has had his British Judo Association membership withdrawn by non-other than George Kerr, coach of former World Champion Peter Seisenbacher (Aut) and now Chairman of the BJA. Kerr announced that he had placed certain papers alleging financial irregularities in Inman's accounts with the Police in Leicester, a city about 90 miles northwest of London. Now that his BJA License has been revoked, Inman has lost public credibility as a coach and therefore will no longer be able to make his living within Judo or the BJA. It should be remembered that Inman has devoted a big part of his life towards the development of British Judo particularly women's judo. His efforts resulted in him being awarded the "O.B.E." by the Queen Elizabeth. In the 15 years that he was the women's team manager, his team has won 13 World titles; 30 European titles; 5 Olympic medals; 15 other world medals; and two European team championships.

Ann Huges, 1986 World Champion and assistant coach to the women's team resigned in an act of solidarity with Roy Inman. In her official letter of resignation she mentioned that she could not longer work for the BJA as long as Kernemained Chairman. She is currently teaching children's classes and is looking towards a future in aerobics.

Aurthur Mapp, the men's team manager for eight years was told that he would be made redundant, then told that he would be given new assignments then finally given a redundancy notice Both he and Inman have sought lega action and have taken the BJA to the Industrial Tribunal. While he is waiting for the whole issue to be resolved, he i retraining as an insurance salesman.

Tony MacConnell, the men's coach was told that his contract would not be renewed because he was "too old." MacConnell is considered by many to be the best matside coach in England. He devoted his life to judo. He is now running outward bound courses in his beloved Lake District.

Czechoslovakia Open

Belgium's Latts Brothers Take Home Two Titles. Japan's "B" Team Claims Two Titles.

Prague, Czechoslovakia - This year's Czech Open was held for two days on March 13-14. Occuring just one week after the Hungarian Open, many players made the 270 mile trip north-west of Budapest, to fight for this title.

Two strong international countries, France and South Korea, who had a large contention at earlier European events were noticeably absent from this competition. Top International players were few, but many future champion hopefuls displayed high level European Judo.

Internationally reknown player Johan Laats ('91 World 2nd and '92 Kano 3rd) and his brother Phillip ('90 Euro 3rd and '91 FRA Int'ni 1st) won their divisions. World contender Nicholas Gill (CAN) finished second to Spain's Leon Villar Beltran ('91 Euro 3rd and '89 Czech Open 1st). In the -95kg division, Habagi (HUN) won his

second title this year and could be ready to challenge Olympic Champion Antal Kovacs for the -95kg top spot on Hungary's National team. Germany's Moerar upset the veteran Kubacki (POL) in the +95kg final. Japan's Yoshinari Murakami (-60kg) and Yoshihara Yoshitaka (-71kg) combined to tie Belgium for the most titles.

apan's heavyweight ace since 1989 is trying to regain his status as the "best" heavyweight player in the World. This year on his way to capturing his 5th All-Japan Open Weight title, Ogawa suffered an injury to his achilles tendon. The injury prevented him from competing in the '93 East Asian Games. He stated plans to participate in final trial for Japan's World team, the All-Japan Weight Category Championships. Ogawa's injury puts a dark cloud over his World title hopes.

The Hidehiko Yoshida (JPN) he '92 Olympic Gold medalist, who easily dominated all challengers in Barcelona, has suffered a major injury to his

foot. At the present time Yoshida is recovering from surgery to the foot, but will miss the All-Japan Weight Category Championships. The final decision on who will fight for Japan at -78kg in this year's World Championships will be up to the All- Japan Judo Federation's selection committee and this probably will not be known until late June.

All Japan Judo Championship

Ogawa Wins Fifth Title Over Rival Konno. Future Young Star K.Makishi Reaches Quarterfinals.

Budokan Hall, Tokyo - The legendary Budokan Martial Arts Hall was the site of the 1993 All Japan Open Weight Championships. Held on April 29th, a national holiday known as "Midori-No-Hi" (Green Day), over 10,000 spectators plus a national T.V. audience watched N.Ogawa defend his title as the best player in Japan.

Ogawa Naoya (25 yrs.), made his international debut winning at the 1987 World Championships in Essen; he won his first All-Japan Championship in 1989. Over the last 2 years he has had to settle for second at all of "Big 3" events (Olympics, Worlds, and the Kano Cup). Ogawa's record is none the less impressive. With a total of 14 medals from "The Big 3", four of which are World titles, Ogawa is the second most successful player in the History of Judo after the great Yasuhiro Yamashita.

Ogawa's 1993 progression to the title:

• 1st Round

Ogawa beat the veteran Jun Toikawa (Tokai University Alumni) in the first round by Kosoto-gake in 3:35

• 2nd Round Ogawa beat Takavuki Sakabe

Semifinal

Ogawa faced Tenri University graduate, Naoto Yabu of Nippon Steel. Yabu was having a good day with his Harai-goshi, defeating top 86kg player Yoshio Nakamura, a Tokai University alumni now with Asahikase, with Awase-waza in 2:02 sec. Against Ogawa, Yabu's Haraigoshi had no effect. With neither player attacking aggressively, the match dragged down to a sluggish stalemate. With 12 seconds to go Yabu received a Shido penalty and the match went to Ogawa.

Mochida, '89 World 2nd and '92 Kano 1st, realizes this is his last shot at a World title and will do anything to beat out Yoshida.

The players to watch at the Worlds:

• Daniel Lascau (Ger)

The 1991 World Champion was eliminated in the first round at the Barcelona Olympics by B.J.Kim (KOR). Very effective with morotegari and powerful counter moves his conditioning will be a major factor in his performance.

Johan Latts (Belgium)

The '92 Olympics were not kind to Latts. The '91 World second place finisher lost to Yoshida in the semifinals and lost the bronze medal final to B.J.Kim (KOR). A third place finish at the '92 Kano Cup proved he is a strong player. With luck his Uchimata and effective Osotogan could earn



a contest-match, Shimewaza (Choke Techniques) may be one of the most effective choices; However, it is one of the most misunderstood methods in its application and practice.

Shimewaza carries a certain mystique in its role in judo. Its natural interplay with Newaza (Matwork) and its immediate physical results bring forth an element of surprise as well as a psychological influence. Unfortunately, many students abandon Shimewaza and or develop a great fear of its potential. These responses can usually be linked to a students limited exposure and overall technical uncertainty. Therefore, it is our goal to examine some essential points and considerations when applying Shimewaza.

There are two basic methods of shimewaza; each requires the restriction of either: 1. Blood-Oxygen circulation or 2. Oxygen flow (Respiratory). The first method is achieved when pressure to the arteries along the neck (carotid) is applied; a blood-oxygen deficiency is created, resulting in an immediate loss of consciousness. The second relies on the application of pressure to the Adams Apple region (Trachea). Often times the arms are wrapped around the neck blocking the natural oxygen flow to the lungs; eventually leading to a lose of consciousness. These types of shimewaza are usually the result of being rushed into constraining your opponent too soon. They are not practical, as they are too difficult and time consuming in rendering your opponent unconscious. it is important to note that the loss of consciousness in the two methods are temporary. When executing either of the above methods, the key is a properly positioned grip



both sides of the Dohmyaku. It is easy to see that there are numerous possibilities that may be developed to enter and complete Shimewaza. Similarly, the physical sensations such as dizziness and speech impairment may be produced by the simple act of pressing and lightly massaging an opponent's neck for a short duration. Even the most ordinary circumstances can create an unexpected Shimewaza experience. This brings to mind the following story:

used in Gyaku-Jyuji-jime to press

A man clothed in a suit and tie noticed a dizzy feeling while being seated on the left side of a train that was commuting from Connecticut to New York. The following day while seated on the right side, he felt perfectly normal. He later discovered that his tight tie was pressing the sensitive spot of his throat, revealing symptoms of Shimewaza. The finding of this spot-point can vary from one individual to another, depending on which side (left or right) is most sensitive.

in retrospect, the term "choke" (Shime) maybe inappropriate to describe the so-called "choke techniques" and that "Press Point" (of the arteries or trachea) may be more fitting one.

Lastly, but most importantly follow your instructor's directions in the event of a judoka's loss of consciousness so they may be safely revived.

Combination Technique: Sasae-Tsurikomi-Ashi to Yoko-sutemi

In this issue, I will offer a solution for when your Sasae- Tsurikomi-Ashi attempt fails.

To those of us who use Sasae-Tsurikomi-Ashi, we realize it can be difficult at times to complete the throw. Instead of stepping back out and wasting your "Sasae" attack I recommend you try following through with a Sutemi-waza (body sacrifice throw).

The key point to remember in getting combinations to work is commitment; committing yourself to completely throw with the 1st throw. The combination presented in this issue will not work if the Sasae-tsurikomiashi is attempted with half effort, and half speed. You must attack with the intention to throw with "Sasae", when the throw "fails" then you switch to Yoko-sutemi.

My Favorite Technique

THE FUNDAMENTALS OF TECHNIQUES

Sasae-Tsurikomi-Ashi to Yoko-Sutemi Combination

• [Fig.1]

Tori steps in with Right Sasaetsurikomi-ashi, it is not effective due to lack of kuzushi.

• [Fig.2 to Fig.3]

At the moment Tori realizes the "Sasae" is not working, Tori flows in a continuous motion into Yoko-sutemi; sliding his right leg out and over the outside of Uke's left shin.

• [Fig.3 through Fig.5]

Once into the Yoko-sutemi action the tori pulls the Uke out and down, completing the throw at a 45 degree angle in the front left area of the uke.

It is hard to get a throwing Ippon with this combination, but done correctly a throwing wazaari or yuko is possible. Following up the throw with newaza is



a very effective way to finish off your opponent.





Obituary

Legendary Judoka Masahiko Kimura (7 Dan) Passes On.

Tokyo, Japan - One of Judo's most colorful figures, Masahiko Kimura died of Lung cancer in the early morning hours on April 18th at St. Mari Ann University Hospital in Kawasaki, Japan. He was 75 years old.

Considered by his peers as the strongest player of his generation, his larger than life persona and exploits made him one of Japan's most controversial figures in the 1940's and 50's.

Born in Kumamoto Prefecture on the island of Kyushu, Japan. Kimura was considered a "gifted" judo player from the first time he set foot on the mat. By the time he was a senior in High School he had reached the rank of 4th Dan.

In 1935 Kimura won his first major title, the All-Japan Collegiate Championships at the age of 17. Soon after he captured the All-Japan Championship. The record of this period shows no player came close to defeating Kimura and he went on to win the All-Japan 3-times consecutively until the All-Japan was stopped due to World War II. After the war Kimura returned to Judo competition and competed in the 1949 All-Japan

Championships at the age of 31. In the finals, Kimura (then 7 Dan) faced Takahiko Ishikawa (then 6 Dan). The historic battle that ensued went back and forth with neither out performing the other (Wazaari was the lowest score possible for this period). After several tie breaking matches the referees referred the decision to the highest ranking official, Kyuzo Mifune (10th Dan), who created a controversy by awarding the title to both men. A short while after the 1949 All-Japan, Kimura retired from amateur Judo and tried to create a professional Judo league which brought him at odds with the Judo Community. When Pro-Judo fell through, economic neccesities forced him to became a pro-wrestler which distanced him even further from the Judo establishment. As a pro- wrestler Kimura's knack for controversy and fracas made him well known in post-war Japan. During the later years of his life he returned to Judo and instructed at his alma mater Takushoku University. In 1981 Kimura came to the United States and in a clinic sponsored by Judo Journal, taught the finer points of his Judo to over 350 people who attended.

Kimura is best remembered for his record of 14 years without a loss. People still praise him and we at the Judo Journal agree: "There never was a player like Kimura - Before or Since!"

All Japan Womens Judo Championships

Sixteen Year Old Upsets World And Olympic Contenders. Captures Title As Japan's Top Woman Player.

Tokyo, JAPAN - The 8th annual All-Japan Open Weight Judo Championships for Women were held on April 8 in Nagoya, a city in central Japan.

With the retirement of six-time winner Yoko Tanabe, this year's event was a wide-open affair with many potential winners. The pre-tournament favorites, '91 World contender Kaori Suzuki (Komatsu) and '92 Olympic Bronze medalist Yoko Sakaue (Nagasaki TV), did well, but ultimate victory went to Yanagawa High School's Noriko Anno.

Anno (5'3", 174lbs) defeated big Asada ('92 Fukuoka 5th) in the semifinals to face the even bigger Kaori Suzuki (5'5", 210lbs) for the title. Anno, a national high school champion, has been competing at this level for about a year. With top placings at the Junior Worlds (2nd) and 3rd at the tough Fukuoka International, Anno wasn't daunted by the level of competition.

In the finals, Anno quickly attacked Suzuki with a speedy Ouchigari for a knockdown (good for Int'nl Koka,but under All-Japan rules Yuko is minimum). Frustrated, Suzuki redoubled

her attacks, but Anno blocked all her attempts. In the last seconds of the match Suzuki pulled Anno into newaza and tried to apply shimewaza to no avail. Time soon expired and Anno's Ouchigari gave her the edge. Anno received a 2-0 judges decision and captured her first All-Japan title, becoming the youngest A.J. title holder to date.
