

COLLECTOR'S TOURS WILL RAMS AY, FOUNDER OF THE AFFORDABLE ART FAIR, TELLS BEN SPRIGGS WHY ART IS FOR ALL AND PICKS HIS FUTURE CLASSICS

ollecting art is a lot easier than you might think," says Will Ramsay, the brains behind the Affordable Art Fair, which takes place this and next weekend in two London locations. "Contrary to what a lot of people think, you don't have to be an art expert or a squillionaire to take part."

Turned onto art by an inspirational art teacher - "He called my distinctly not good daubings 'brilliant', which got my attention" - Ramsay made his first purchase, aged 19, in Moscow. "It's no longer my favourite, but it's still a meaningful reminder of that point in my life," he says.

In 1999, after years of shoddy service in various art galleries, Ramsay set up the fairs, each now bringing together more than 100 art galleries, selling pieces priced at £4,000 and under, with an average selling price of about £700. "I felt most galleries weren't catering for the majority of customers," Ramsay says. "There were no prices and you could barely get anyone to acknowledge you."

Thirteen years later and he has brought his art-for-all concept to the rest of the globe, with new launches this autumn in Hamburg, Mexico City, Rome, Seattle and Stockholm. He's transformed the way we buy art, revolutionising the elitist gallery world in the same way that Oddbins and Majestic changed the fine wine market. Yet, while there have been sweeping changes, he admits some buyers are still daunted. "If you still find it scary," he says, "make sure you ask lots of questions and, above all, buy what you like, not what you think you should be buying or what someone tells you to buy."






