

Statement from the Georgia NAACP

The Georgia NAACP applauds Governor Nathan Deal for exercising pragmatic wisdom in vetoing House Bill 859, which would legalize firearms at all public colleges in Georgia.

The gun measure, known as the "campus carry" bill, was long sought by conservatives and Second Amendment activists who cast it as a crucial safety measure for students, faculty and administrators to protect themselves. Until this year, their efforts were stymied by critics including college presidents, who warn that expanding gun rights to campuses would increase the likelihood of violent shootings.

"The Second Amendment is not absolute. Reasonable patriots understand the need to balance the right to bear arms against the right of the citizenry to be free proliferation of firearms that diminishes public safety in the name corporate profits for gun manufacturers" said
