POETS AND POETRY FROM THE SOUTH DOWNS

Winchester is the western gateway to the South Downs National Park and the start, or finish, of the 100 mile South Downs Way. It is a landscape cherished by walkers, cyclists, hikers and strollers, and it has a rich literary heritage. This reading brings together seven poets, whose lives and imaginations have been shaped by the South Downs and our chalk landscape. Curated by prize-winning poet Stephanie Norgate (right), Reader in Creative Writing at the University of Chichester and a tutor on Sussex libraries Reading the South project, the participating writers are well-published and prize-winning poets as well as emerging literary talents, whose work either features or is inspired by the South Downs.

Each of the seven poets will be contributing a new poem in response to the South Downs, especially commissioned by the festival and co-funded by the South Downs National Park Authority. The ticket price for this event includes a programme booklet, also co-funded by the SDNPA, which features the work of the Chalk Poets.

IAN DUHIG SOPHIE HANNAH KIM MOORE

lan Duhig was born in London of Irish Catholic parents, and now lives in Leeds. He won the National Poetry Competition twice, in 1987 and 2001, and the Forward Prize for Best Poem in 2001. Named as one of the Poetry Book Society's New Generation poets, his work has also been shortlisted for the T S Eliot Prize. His eighth collection *The Blind Roadmaker* (Picador) was shortlisted for the 2016 Roehampton Poetry Prize. 'The most original poet of his generation' – Carol Ann Duffy.

Sophie Hannah is a poet and an internationally bestselling writer of psychological crime fiction. She has published six collections of poetry and is studied at GCSE, A-level and degree level across the UK. Pessimism for Beginners was shortlisted for the 2007 TS Eliot Award and her most recent collection Marrying the Ugly Millionaire was published by Carcanet in 2015. In 2014 Sophie Hannah published a new Hercule Poirot novel, The Monogram Murders, which was a bestseller in more than fifteen countries.

Kim Moore lives and works in Cumbria, combining poetry with teaching and playing the trumpet. Her first full-length collection *The Art of Falling* (Seren) was published in 2015 and her first pamphlet *If We Could Speak Like Wolves* was a winner in the Poetry Business Pamphlet Competition, judged by Carol Ann Duffy, was chosen as an *Independent* Book of the Year in 2012. Her poem *In That Year* was shortlisted for the Forward Prize for Best Single Poem in 2015.

SINÉAD MORRISSEY

In the summer of 2014 the British Council sent Sinéad Morrissey on a trip to Moscow to track down Soviet state files about her grandfather, Sean Morrissey, who had been a stalwart member of the Communist Party of Northern Ireland. In this talk Sinéad Morrissey discusses her trip to the heart of the former Soviet Union in search of an Irish past.

Sinéad Morrissey was born in 1972 and grew up in Belfast. She read English and German at Trinity College, Dublin, from which she took her PhD in 2003. She has published five collections with Carcanet, most recently *Parallax*, which won the T S Eliot Prize in 2013. She is Belfast's inaugural poet laureate and Professor of Creative Writing at Queen's University, Belfast.

STANZAS IN STONE

SIMON ARMITAGE AND PIP HALL

In 2010 Simon Armitage was commissioned by Ilkley Literature Festival to write a series of poems responding to the landscape of the South Pennines and letter-carver Pip Hall was asked to carve the poems in stone in six locations along the watershed between Ilkley and Marsden, where Simon was born. In this event the two artists meet again to discuss their unique collaboration on the 45-mile Stanza Stones trail, with site selection and route-finding created by landscape architect Tom Lonsdale.

A recipient of numerous prizes and awards, Simon Armitage has published over a dozen collections of poetry, including Seeing Stars (Faber 2010), an acclaimed translation of Sir Gawain and the Green Knight (Faber 2007), and Paper Aeroplane (Faber 2014), a selection covering 25 years of published work. A broadcaster and presenter, he also writes extensively for television and radio, is the author of two novels, the bestselling memoir All Points North (Faber 1999), and Walking Home (Faber 2012) and Walking Away (Faber 2015), recording his poetic journeys along the Pennine Way and the South West Coast Path. In 2010 he received the CBE for services to poetry and was appointed Professor of Poetry at Oxford University in 2015.



Pip Hall studied typography and graphics at Reading University, and developed her love of lettering with the city's fabled publisher Two Rivers Press. Her desire to make things led to working in stone and for the past twenty years she has lived on the edge of the Yorkshire Dales in Cumbria. One of the country's leading letter-carvers, her work includes architectural lettering, commemorative and garden sculpture, relief carving and public art commissions, such as Sheffield's seating scheme with the poet Matt Black, and most recently Stanza Stones. Two of the six stones were made in her studio and four were cut in situ, generally while immersed in the water course; a seventh secret stone has yet to he discovered

TRUTH OF THE IMAGINATION

FRANCES LEVISTON SHAZEA QURAISHI DERYN REES-JONES

Frances Leviston's first collection *Public Dream* (Picador) was shortlisted for the T S Eliot Prize, the Forward Prize for Best First Collection and the Jerwood-Aldeburgh First Collection Prize. Her second collection *Disinformation* (Picador) was shortlisted for the International Dylan Thomas Prize and the *TLS* called it 'poetry of a rare seriousness and excellence.'

Shazea Quraishi's first pamphlet, The Courtesans Reply (flipped eye) was a sequence responding to the Caturbhani, four plays written around 300 BC on the life of courtesans in India. Her collection The Art of Scratching (Bloodaxe) was described as 'lines which are simultaneously spare and sensuous' – Poetry London.

Deryn Rees-Jones is Professor of Poetry at the University of Liverpool, where she is also editor of the Pavilion Poetry imprint. She has published four collections of poetry: *The Memory Tray* (Seren 1994) was shortlisted for the Forward Prize for Best First Collection; more recently *Burying the Wren* (Seren 2012) was shortlisted for the T S Eliot Prize and was also a *TLS* Book of the Year and a Poetry Book Society Recommendation.

THE MUSIC OF UPROAR

CHOMAN HARDI BERNARD O'DONOGHUE SINÉAD MORRISSEY

Born in Kurdistan, brought up in Iraq and Iran, **Choman Hardi** now lives and works in Baghdad as a poet, translator and academic researcher She has published three collections of poetry in Kurdish and one in English, *Life for Us* (Bloodaxe, 2004), following her arrival in the UK as a refugee. Her poems explore the impact of migration, uprising and conflict, especially on women.

Poet, critic and lecturer, **Bernard O'Donoghue** is an Emeritus Fellow of Wadham College, Oxford, where he taught Medieval English and Modern Irish Poetry. Among his many books are six collections of poetry, a verse translation of *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight* and most recently *Reading Chaucer's Poems* (Faber 2015).

Sinéad Morrissey has published five collections (Carcanet), three of which were shortlisted for the TS Eliot Prize and her last book, *Parallax* (Carcanet) won the award in 2014, the chair of the judges noting that the collection was 'politically, historically and personally ambitious, expressed in beautifully turned language.'

WATCHER OF THE SKIES

SIMON ARMITAGE MIMI KHALVATI HELEN MORT

Born and brought up in the Pennines, **Simon Armitage** still lives in West Yorkshire, and the toughness of millstone grit is evident in all his work, whether poetry, translations, fiction, drama or memoir. One of Britain's most invigorating and influential writers, Simon Armitage's poems deliver the nation's vernacular in potent lyrics combining breezy wit and poignant tenderness.

Mimi Khalvati was born in Tehran, Iran, grew up on the Isle of Wight (explored in *The Chine*, Carcanet 2002) and trained as an actor and director in London. She has published eight collections of poetry and been shortlisted for the TS Eliot Prize, and her most recent collection, *The Weather Wheel* (Carcanet 2014), was a Poetry Book Society Recommendation and Book of the Year in the *Independent*. She has performed her work extensively in Britain and overseas and held many residencies and fellowships.

Helen Mort is a multiple winner of the Foyle Young Poets award, the youngest poet in residence at the Wordsworth Trust, and her first collection, *Division Street* (Chatto 2013) was shortlisted for the T S Eliot and Costa Prizes and won the 2014 Fenton Aldeburgh Prize. She lectures in creative writing at the University of Leeds, reviews on BBC Radios 3 and 4, and her second collection *No Map Could Show Them* (Chatto) was published in June 2016. She also writes about climbing and running and is editing an anthology of wilderness writing by women.

The writer **Tim Dee** (above left) has worked for BBC Radio 3 and 4 for over 25 years, producing such classics as *Poetry Please* and more recently *The Echo Chamber*, focussing on contemporary poets. With her first full collection Black Country (Chatto 2014), Liz Berry announced herself as a captivating new presence, the winner of three major awards and prizes and poetry book of the year in the Guardian, the Daily Telegraph, the Daily Mail, Big Issue and the Morning Star.

A SINGLE LINE OF POETRY

What would a single line of poetry look like if it became a physical object? It would, of course, depend on the line.

In the two weeks before the poetry festival, the Fine Art students of Winchester School of Art will be studying poems by all of the poets appearing in the festival. From this material, they will select just one line to serve as the starting point for a large-scale collective artwork, which they will construct in the sculpture studio. The department has made a habit of beginning its academic year in this way, with some 150 students collaborating on a single artwork. The results are unpredictable but always impressive.



There will be a special reception for viewing the project in the Winchester Gallery at Winchester School of Art, where the drawings made in the development of the artwork will be on show, and in the Sculpture Studio (on the same site) for the finished object.

DRAWINGS BY GREG GILBERT

Created specifically for the Winchester Poetry
Festival, this series of drawings by **Greg Gilbert**builds upon themes developed for his 2015 solo
exhibition at Southampton City Art Gallery. Each
drawing takes a different poem as its starting
point, combining historic photographic sources,
postcards and newspaper cuttings to create
lyrical interpretations that move beyond
illustration. Drawing upon the work of Robert
Frost, John Masefield and Anne Carson
among others, these images vividly explore the
relationship between art and literature.

Since first being exhibited in 2013, Greg Gilbert's miniature biro drawings have been displayed at the Royal College of Art and the Science Museum in London and at Pallant House in Chichester, winning Best in the South of England at the National Open Art Competition and selection for the Royal Academy's Summer Exhibition. He is one of the artists-in-residence selected for the regeneration of God's House Tower in Southampton.

THE EMERGENCY POET

Meanwhile, on the streets of Winchester, on Saturday 8 and Sunday 9 October, anyone in need of poetic assistance can visit the Emergency Poet. From her 1970 ambulance, poet **Deborah Alma** prescribes poems to help cure all known complaints. Mixing the serious, the therapeutic and the theatrical, Nurse Verse dispenses curative poems, whether patients are suffering from love-sickness, wriggly children, lost words or a faint heart. Patients take part in a free private poetic health consultation with the Emergency Poet, and within ten minutes will be prescribed a playfully appropriate poem, verse or lyric.



COMMUNITY PROJECTS

There's more to the festival than the readings and events at the Discovery Centre. In partnership with **Hampshire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust**, the festival is producing a series of poster poems for the hospital waiting rooms at the Basingstoke & North Hampshire Hospital and the Royal Hampshire County Hospital, featuring poems newly written or commissioned by poets appearing at the festival.

In partnership with Solent Mind, the festival is providing a series of poetry workshops at **Winchester Wellbeing Centre**, to help develop confidence and self-expression among participants. The workshops are devised and facilitated by Southampton poet **Matt West**, founding director of ArtfulScribe and Southampton's first poet laureate for children.

The festival is also working with **Treloar College** in Alton, Hampshire, a school at the national forefront of education for physically disabled children and young people. The students will be studying and writing poetry in a programme of workshops with the prize-winning poet **Hannah Lowe**, author of *Chick* (Bloodaxe 2013) and *Chan* (Bloodaxe 2016); her family memoir *Long Time*, *No See* (Periscope 2015) was a Radio 4 Book of the Week.

The A-level set text *Poems of the Decade*, edited by William Sieghart (Faber 2015), includes poems by two of the festival poets, Ian Duhig and Sinéad Morrissey, and they will be reading and discussing their work with students at **Peter Symonds College**, with kind support from the Symondians Association.

In 2014 four different groups of poets meeting in a pub established **Not The Winchester Poetry Festival** to provide a fringe counterpoint to the main festival. **Not** aims to add to the excitement of the 2016 festival by providing the opportunity to hear local poets, spoken word artists and musicians, as well as open mic sessions. ABOUT MAGMA

Launched twenty-five years ago by a group of enthusiastic members of Laurie Smith's *Poetry in the Making* evening class at London's City Lit, *Magma* has since grown into one of the UK's leading poetry magazines. More than a magazine, *Magma* is a community of people, open to everyone, and passionate about celebrating a rich mix of poetry, from established, emerging and brand new poets alike.

The magazine appears three times a year, and the current issue, *Magma* 65, explores the theme of 'Revolution' to complement one of the themes this year at Winchester Poetry Festival. We are delighted to be co-hosting two activities with the festival this year: Things Being Various, Sunday 9 October at 12.00pm (see page 11) and Letters to Keats, *Magma*'s pop-up poetry competition.



Magma has designed a pop-up competition for the Winchester Poetry Festival, on the theme of Letters to Keats. The judges, drawn from the Magma editorial board, are looking for letters written and submitted during the weekend itself, directly addressed to the poet John Keats.

The content is up to you. You might want share your impressions of 21st century Winchester, the poetry festival, your thoughts about the state of poetry today, write a simple fan letter or about matters personal to you. You might have some questions for him. There is no word limit but your entry must be handwritten, legible and on an official single sheet of crown octavo paper ($7\frac{1}{2} \times 5$ inches) picked up from the *Magma* stand. You may use both sides and you can write in prose, poetry, or a combination of the two.

Please hand your entries in at the Magma stand at Winchester Discovery Centre by midday on Sunday 9 October. The winner and two runners-up will be announced during the final session on Sunday afternoon. First prize: a two-year subscription to Magma plus digital publication of the winning entry in Magma's festival blog and newsletter. Two runners-up will each receive a free copy of Magma and various other poetry treats. One entry per person only.

BY TRAIN


Winchester Station is less than ten minutes walk from the Discovery Centre. Follow signs to the city centre and cross the carfax junction onto City Road. At the end of the road turn right into Jewry Street – the Discovery Centre is next to Theatre Royal Winchester.

BY CAR

Follow signs for Winchester City Centre from J9 or J11 of the M3. Jewry Street is on the one way system; follow signs for Andover. The Discovery Centre complex is on the left hand side of the northern end of Jewry Street. (Sat Nav: use postcode SO23 8RZ to avoid overshooting.) There is limited pay-and-display parking behind the building.

Park & Ride is a great way to get into and around the city. There are three Park & Ride sites, St Catherine's and Barfield, located at East Winchester (off Junction 10 of the M3) and the South Winchester Site (off junction 11 of the M3). The Park & Ride bus stops a few moments walk from the Discovery Centre in City Road. Please note that Park & Ride bus services cease mid-evening and do not operate on Sundays.
