Greetings from Bayneville Grange.



These programs can be used to attract non-Grangers to Grange meetings.

Your program can be for someone that is a non-Granger or maybe a Grange member. Most importantly the program should be meaningful and enjoyable. Thus this will give your members another reason to come and hopefully give them a smile.

What else can your program do? Do a press release or a media advisory to a nearby TV stations. Make the program exciting and you might get to hear or read about it. This is even a better way to let non-members know what your Grange is all about.

Check out the Honor Grange requirements for this year. As you do these items add them to a list and email them to me. Do this as least quarterly and it is much easier to keep up with your reporting.

IMPORTANT: It was brought up that I did not receive some items that were sent to me last year. For that reason I am asking you to email me at KDOINews@kc.rr.com and LEBCO913@kc.rr.com and tell me what you have sent to me and when. When emailing me type "Grange" in your Subject line. This will allow me to recognize your emails. If I have not responded within 2 weeks, email me again. I have also amended the 2015 Brey Scholarship Applications to include the applicant's email address so I can follow-up with them.

Also email me each time that you bring in a new member with their name, mailing address and email address. This way I can confirm that your Grange is given credit for the new member. Also I would like to contact them and welcome them to Grange.

Also added to the Kansas Grange website is a 2015 Photo Release that should be used at major events and programs in which to take photographs. The release gives Local, State, or National Grange the right to use their image. This should also be used for recognizable people in photos that are not at public events that are entered into the Photo Contest. I would like to print some of these entries in future publications so that those not making the convention can still see some of the photos. At larger Grange events, you may put a sign that states that at the Grange event photographs and video may be taken and used in publications or on the web. Coming to the event acknowledges agreement to use their image for Grange use. These should be posted at each entrance so that all can see.

And in parting, recognize that April is Grange Month. Nothing is coming from National Grange this year but you can still go to the National Website and download posters and other items that can be modified for 2015. Let me know what your Grange does to recognize our Grange Month.
