Running the Race, Running to Win

Running a race is something everyone does at some point in life. Professional runners spend many hours training and preparing for race day. The runner must practice for the competition. Often times practice can be grueling and difficult. The runner has to overcome many distractions and stumbling blocks. The runner may develop an injury, or experience interruptions that make practicing difficult. Often doing pleasurable things tempt us not to practice. Fear and lack of confidence can also stand in the way of the most experienced runner. Even on competition day runners can run into "the wall," that physical feeling that the runner feels when he/she thinks they just can't go on. The mind has to fight the body to continue the race. Yet, for the great runners, running is an obsession that allows them to overcome all obstacles.

"Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever." I Corinthians 9:24-25

In many ways, the experience of faith is like running a race. Daily we face many challenges to our faith. Sickness, injury, and calamity are the big distractions experienced by everyone and so we must pray, trust, and endure. Yet, we often let the stumbling blocks and small distractions trip us up and keep us out of the race. So

what must we do to run the race with endurance? Proverbs 24:16 tells us, "Though a righteous man falls seven times, he will get up, but the wicked will stumble into ruin." If we fall, that is not the end, we get up and keep going. We can take courage from being in Christ because we are set free.

Paul, in Galatians 5:7, asked why the Galatians had stopped running their race. Unfortunately, they fell into the trap of trying to earn God's favor. They had lost the joy and peace that they had received through the simple belief and trust in Jesus. For us, it is also tempting to be performance driven, to be "good enough" for God's pleasure and that he is only pleased with me when I am achieving or doing things just right. This is the burden of slavery, that we think we can do it ourselves. We are saved by grace, and we are changed by His spirit. It is not something we do alone; it is something He alone can do for us. But we still must practice and train to run the race set before us. Proverbs 2:1 tells us to store up His commands. We must dive into His word so that our lives can be governed by truth and motivated by love. We, like the runner, must be disciplined in everything. Remember, studying is our training, it gives us discipline, it trains us to run His race.

Top 10 Best Ways to Pass a NationsUniversity Exam

- 10. Apply the material as you go. Read the material and especially the Bible verses for formation and not just for information. The more you can apply to your life, the more you will be able to recall it. Take notes and reviewing your notes helps you to recall important information.
- 9. Take one module at a time and do core courses in sequence. Many students try to skip around or read ahead. And for some students who live far away from a computer it may be necessary to take more than one exam at once. However, the Bible itself is full of endless spiritual lessons and life applications. Each course and each module is designed to help students explore God's Word in a new way and at a deeper level. Each course in the core curriculum builds upon another.
- 8. Do not take your studies for granted. The longer you are away from your studies, the harder it is to get back into it. Try not to pause your studies in the middle of a course as typically each module in a course relates to the other.
- 7. Use your time wisely. Independent study takes discipline. Be generous with your time for God and your family. Train yourself to be efficient with the rest of your time and learn your limits in work and ministry.
- 6. Often, multi-tasking is helpful. Many students are now using audio helps on the Internet to listen to Scripture and to NU course material while they drive or walk or clean the house, etc.
- **5. Read exam questions carefully.** Some exam questions require the student to "Choose the Incorrect answer." This requires careful deliberation and focus in order to succeed. For this reason, it is best to utilize the full time period allowed for each exam.
- 4. Study to succeed on the first attempt. Having three attempts at each exam is a good thing but do not use it as a crutch to lean on. The first two attempts are NOT practice tests. If you do need other attempts, use those 5 days in between for more careful and deliberate study.
- 3. Ask questions. When it is convenient, form a study group and ask each other questions. Use the student forums or the NU Facebook page to encourage and challenge each other. Contact your advisor for additional help and encouragement. If you need help with a particular module, contact your advisor BEFORE you use your third attempt. He or she can offer advice to help you prepare.
- 2. Be healthy. Get a good night's sleep before taking an exam! Taking care of yourself physically also helps with your spiritual and mental states. Eating a good breakfast and exercising the morning of an exam can help get your blood flowing and your brain working at a more optimum level.
- 1. Pray. God is with us always and especially wants us to communicate with Him while we are studying His Word. Pray for clarity, a sharp mind and a ready recollection before each exam. It is our prayer for all our NU students that you allow God to reveal Himself to you in new ways each day, not just exam day. May He bless you with Wisdom and Truth in your academic AND spiritual endeavors.


