

When it comes to raising money to operate the Belle Isle Aquarium, preserve the island's historic architecture, engage the community, provide programming, and partner with the DNR on island improvements, we take a "multi-task" approach. Throughout the year, we apply for grants, work with donors, run a membership program,

and host fundraisers. Events are a fun, memorable, and productive pathway to achieve our fundraising goals and fulfill the mission of the Belle Isle Conservancy.

This past May, we raised almost \$1.1 million at the PwC Grand Prixmiere, presented by Chevrolet! This is a huge step towards the millions of dollars of needed island improvements and amenities, and programs. In June, almost 200 people attended the Scott Fountain Pewabic Party, raising almost \$10,000 towards replacing the Pewabic tile mosaics that were ripped out of the fountain five years ago. Mark your calendars for the annual Garden Party on Belle Isle - it will take place on Tuesday, September 15. Organized by the Belle Isle Conservancy's Conservatory Committee and Grosse Pointe garden clubs, the funds raised at the Garden Party will go towards repairing, restoring, and re-landscaping the koi lily pond. On Thursday, October 8, we will host the 11th annual Polish the Jewel Legacy Luncheon at the Belle Isle Casino. Dr. Shauna Ryder Diggs is chairing the event, and the revenue raised at the event will be directed towards discovery playground projects on the island. And last but not least, we cap off the year with the third annual Light Up the Aquarium party on December 4, a themed event to support new exhibits and improvements at the Aquarium.

Attending or supporting our fundraising events is a great way to "multitask". You can network with Belle Isle supporters, enjoy the unique venues on the island, have a great time, make new memories, and help us generate revenue for the park — all at the same time!

ANNUAL BELLE ISLE PARK SPRING CLEAN-UP

Following in our annual tradition, once again about 250 volunteers braved the very cool temperature to participate in our annual Belle Isle Park Spring Clean-Up on **Saturday**, **April 25**th. After cleaning all around the entire island, they gathered back at the Flynn Pavilion for the hot dog roast. Supplies were provided by: Big Boy Restaurant at E. Grand Boulevard and E. DETROIT RIVER WATER FESTIVAL

On a cool, misty morning **Thursday, April 30**th over 650 eighth grade students from 23 Detroit Public School classes descended on Belle Isle for a fun-filled day of environmental education. The 3rd Annual Detroit River Water Festival was hosted by the Friends of the Detroit River with support from various partner organizations with over 120 volunteers participating, including presenters, partner organizations and volunteer groups. Presentations covered water and environmental issues focusing on the Detroit River and Great Lakes area, ranging from algal blooms to zebra mussels and their impact on aquatic ecosystems.

KOI MIXER AT THE AQUARIUM

The Belle Isle Aquarium hosted a special Koi Mixer event to "ring in spring" on **Friday, May 1**st. Held on the eve of the spring Koi Transfer, guests enjoyed drinks and Japanese cuisine while learning about the progress and initiatives happening at America's oldest aquarium. A Japanese Tea Ceremony took place inside the aquarium alcove; while in front of the building, a drum demonstration was performed to the delight of all. The return of the new weathervane, designed by Bruce Gerlach and sponsored by Butzel Long, was also celebrated.

SPRING KOI TRANSFER

A beautiful morning embraced the Spring Koi Transfer on **Saturday, May 2**nd. This may have been our largest koi transfer yet with an estimated 300 people plus bringing their five-gallon buckets to help move the koi from their winter home inside the aquarium basement to the lily pond between the aquarium and conservatory. This bi-annual event started nine years ago by a handful of volunteers; now, the community is heavily involved. This year the Lovely Lyra Ladies demonstrated their acrobatic skills and Blaze and Ember of Warren's Breakout juggled and performed hula hoop acts entertaining the crowd in front of the aquarium. A hot dog roast was provided to the families that helped. CINCO DE MAYO

The Conservatory Committee labeled plants that are indigenous to Mexico with color-coded signs to make them easy to find. This was to tie our exhibits with the Detroit Institute of Arts "Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo in Detroit" that ran from March 15 through July 12.

GRAND PRIXMIERE

The PwC Grand Prixmiere, presented by Chevrolet took place on **Friday, May 29**th at Belle Isle Park. It was a wonderful evening, chaired by Paula & Steve Kiefer, and a great kick off to Grand Prix weekend. The Belle Isle Conservancy is grateful to the corporate partners and guests who generated more than \$1.1 million for Belle Isle at the 2015 PwC Grand Prixmiere. We are amazed by such generosity at this critical time when we are seeking millions of dollars in investment required to restore and maintain the 982-acre park.



SCOTT FOUNTAIN PEWABIC PARTY

Historic Pewabic Pottery hosted over 200 guests on **Friday, June 5**th for the Belle Isle Conservancy's Scott Fountain Pewabic Tile fundraiser. The event was held during Pewabic's "For the House and Garden Show" and generated nearly \$10,000 towards restoring the Pewabic tiles that were damaged during the repair of the fountain's basin in 2010. MIKE POSNER CONCERT AT BELLE ISLE

Mike Posner brought his coast-to-coast Ninja Show Tour to Detroit and Belle Isle on **Tuesday, July 7**th, performing a free non-ticket evening concert at the Bus Stop Shelter across from the Aquarium and Conservatory. The word went out through social media, and the shelter was filled to capacity with about 250 attending. As an encore, Mike sang his new hit, "Buried in Detroit", featured in his new EP – The Truth. In 2012, Mike was a special guest at the BIC's Scott Fountain Pewabic Tile fundraiser. He has a special love for Belle Isle as his mother, Roberta Henrion, was President of the Friends of Belle Isle and volunteers with the Belle Isle Conservancy.

RENAISSANCE EQUESTRIAN'S DREAM TRAIL RIDE

Heavy rain and winds enveloped Belle Isle the morning of **Saturday**, **June 27**th causing the cancellation of the 5th annual Renaissance Equestrian's Dream Trail Ride. About eight trailers arrived mostly from Lapeer County, but weather conditions were dangerous with wind blowing debris around. The group was able to schedule a make-up rain date on Saturday, July 11 at Kensington Metro Park. Hope they will return to Belle Isle next year with better weather.

METRO DETROIT YOUTH DAY

The 33rd annual Metro Detroit Youth Day (MDYD) took place on **Wednesday, July 15**th. More than 30,000 youths ages 8-15 and 1,600 volunteers converged on Belle Isle's Athletic Field for the day. This year's free event included games, contests, sports clinics, celebrity guest appearances, a petting zoo, lunch and more. 120 Scholarships worth more than \$35,000 were awarded. Children provided the entertainment by singing, dancing, a Youth Day Idol Contest and special performances by the Detroit Opera House Children's Chorus and the Jazz Trio from Michigan State University, Detroit. Ed Deeb, co-founder and chairman of MDYD, stated, "Youth Day is about people and organizations working together to provide kids on summer break a fun-filled day out of the house and participating in supervised, constructive activities with their peers."

BLISS

This year BLISS events were held on **Saturday, July 25th and Saturday, August 29th** There is also a BLISS day planned for **Saturday, September 26th** from 10 am – 3 pm. BLISS – Belle Isle Summer Saturdays – is packed with fun for all ages. ADOPT-A-BEACH CLEAN UP

An Adopt-A-Beach Belle Isle shoreline clean up took place on **Saturday, August 8**th This event is a partnership between Barefoot Wine & Bubbly, the Belle Isle Conservancy and the Alliance for the Great Lakes Adopt-a-BeachTM program to help clean up Great Lakes beaches and shorelines making them barefoot friendly. Registration at Sunset Point assigned the volunteers to clean various locations on the island. This was also a memorial to Mary Waterstone, former president of the Friends of Belle Isle, who lead this event in past years.

BELLE ISLE EMERGING PATRONS BIKE GIVEAWAY

The Belle Isle Conservancy's Emerging Patrons Council are encouraging biking at the park with a series of bike-friendly activities and improvements. WHAT IS HAPPENING

REMEMBER DETROIT'S AMUSEMENT PARKS? By Lori Feret

Around Detroit there was: Bob-Lo Island, Sugar Island, Tashmoo Park, Jefferson Beach, Edgewater Park, and Walled Lake Amusement Park to name a few. All are long gone.

Old-timers still recall the fabulous ELECTRIC PARK — Detroit's first "mammoth amusement enterprise" located at E. Jefferson Avenue and the Belle Isle Bridge. Upon its opening in 1906, the Detroit Free Press claimed, "Detroit's Electric Park will be one of the largest in the world..." Owned by Arthur Gaulker and family, it was also known as — Wolff's Park, Pikes Peak and Lunar Pier.

Originally, it was a trolley park at the end of three streetcar lines. There was a large windmill at the entrance with a sign, "The Boardwalk: Just for Fun", a giant Ferris wheel, aerial swings and various other mechanical rides. Live headline acts entertained: the Great Chick (cyclist and comedian), Mademoiselles Patrice (flying trapeze), and Miss Nellie Trumbell (soprano). People flocked to see an interactive scale model of the deadly 1889 Johnstown, PA, flood. Several roller coasters drew thrill seekers; one coaster featured a sign, "Trip

Thru the Clouds - Detroit's Greatest Ride."

Rosenweig, and built over the water. It was one of three building in the park to house the 1916 Detroit Auto Show. The John Philip Sousa Band among others came to play there. Ragtime jazz was performed at the Pier Ballroom designed by Albert Kahn. In 1927, fire destroyed the Coliseum, pier, boardwalk and concession stands.

After many legal battles during the 1920s, the city condemned the park in 1927, and the structures were razed in 1928. This made way for a public park officially named "Gabriel Richard Park" in 1936. Gabriel Richard Park is now a prime spot for bird watching; see the Crain's Business News article from July 29, 2015.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMITTEE NOTES

Roberta Henrion, Historic Preservation Committee

This summer, plans are underway to reinstall the Belle Isle Michigan Marker near its original location at the northeast corner of the Belle Isle Casino. No one knows why the marker was removed. It was found in the Maintenance Yard in good shape.

In 2014, Kimberly Johnson, Commissioner of the Michigan Historical Commission contacted the Belle Isle Conservancy's Historic Preservation Committee to assist in relocating the "missing" marker. Former City of Detroit, Belle Isle Park Manager, Keith Flournoy was instrumental in providing information regarding the markers last known location.

New posts are on order and the marker will be reinstalled by the DNR before the end of the season. Joe Hall, DNR Park Supervisor will coordinate installation

This Marker is one of three in the park. One is in front of the Police Station commemorating the first Police Radio Dispatch, and the other commemorates Ransom Eli Olds located on Central Avenue between Casino Way and Muse Road.

The inscription on the marker reads: "This island, a jewel in the hearts of Detroiters, has provided shining memories for visitors of all ages. About 1845, this site received its present name, Belle Isle, in honor of Governor Lewis Cass' daughter Isabella. On September 23, 1879, this island was purchased by the city of Detroit for \$200,000. Early in the 1880's, the Board of Park Commissioners consulted with Fredrick Law Olmsted, the designer of Central Park in New York City, to plan the development of Belle Isle as a public park. Belle Isle is now a unique island park covering 981 acres and attracting millions of visitors annually. Its most popular features include a beach, the Casino restaurant, beautiful formal gardens, Scott fountain, riding stables, an aquarium, a

It was a very busy year at the Anna Scripps Whitcomb Conservatory. Thanks to the generous grant from the GM Foundation, 26 fourth grade field trips were held at the Belle Isle Aquarium and Anna Scripps Whitcomb Conservatory this past year. An amazing 17 schools and a total of 671 students participated in our field trips.

Twenty volunteers from the Aquarium and Conservatory logged an incredible 832 hours conducting the field trips. WE OPENED, AND THE PEOPLE KEEP COMING

A famous movie quote stated, "If you build it, he will come." Well, in the case of the Belle Isle Aquarium (BIA), we opened, and the people came. Attendance keeps increasing. For the summer (June 5 – Sept. 4), we added Fridays to our open hours. After Labor Day, we will return to our regular schedule – Saturday and Sunday 10 am – 4 pm. The last weekend in July we had over 5,200 visitors at the Aquarium. June 2015, saw 15,551 visitors; while in July, we had 21,712 visitors.

We are excited about the BIA's partnership with the DNR to operate the DNR's 3,000 gallon aquarium tank at the Outdoor Adventure Center (OAC) and to provide tanks in the BIA to quarantine and care for native fish collected by the DNR. When the fish are cleared, they will go on display at the OAC — the first facility of its kind in the U.S. Other achievements this past spring and summer have been:

- Installation of the weathervane funded by Butzel Long slated for late August.
- Completion of the restoration of the cupola skylight, and the restoration of the final skylight.
- Restoration of the Neptune cartouche has begun.
- Cleaning of the green opaline tiles lining our ceiling began
 in preparation for ceiling repair. With a grant funding a
 number of renovations, we are bringing in a restoration artist
 from Conservation and Museum Services to properly address
 repair work done on the ceiling over the years. Another item
 funded by the grant will be a renovation to our bathrooms
 this fall.
- Five more tanks were restored by ASL American Sealants, Inc., and two new exhibits were added: the Panther Chameleon and the Upside-Down Jellyfish — Come meet the new members of our family!
- Tankscaping and tank restoration work is underway on one of the reef tanks and a brackish water tank exhibit.

 We are working with the DNR on tree removal

around the lily pond and a restoration of the lily pond itself.


- Thanks to the Grosse Pointe Farms Questers #147, we have a new digital sign system and were able to refurbish the old display case.
- Field lessons to fourth graders from Detroit Public Schools were provided by the BIA Education Team, Belle Isle Conservancy (BIC) staff and volunteers, and BIA volunteers as part of a General Motors Corps. (GM) grant.
- Youth education was extremely popular this summer with interactive and imaginative 3rd Saturday programs by Gloria and Diane Brishke. They are introducing a new Aqua-Rangers Club this fall funded by grants from GM and the EPA. The Detroit Opera House invited our Outreach Team, Diane and Gloria Brishke, to host an Aquarium Youth Education Outreach there in April.
- The Science Saturdays Lecture series continues with the efforts of the Science and Education Committee led by Dr. Jeffrey Ram.
- A large number of groups have contacted our Office
 Manager to schedule docent lead tours of the Aquarium,
 and our Events Coordinator has scheduled a few weddings,
 photo sessions, cocktail receptions, dinner parties, and
 birthday parties.
- We held a Koi Gala on the eve of the Spring Koi Transfer and on August 15th celebrated the 111th birthday of the Aguarium and Conservatory.

It has been a very busy season at the BIA with a long list of accomplishments that keeps the ball rolling!

NATURAL RESOURCE STEWARDSHIP ON THE ISLAND

The Belle Isle Conservancy's Island Stewardship Environmental Conservation Committee (IS ECC) is fortunate to have a small, but steady group of volunteers, but we're always looking to grow. Belle Isle is a large park and there are many natural features on the island, most notably the wet-mesic flatwoods. We are looking for Detroit locals and environmentalists to join the IS ECC to guide

environmental stewardship, advocate for nature on the island and support DNR-led ecological restoration initiatives. Expertise in the natural environment is not required, although highly desired. Constructive attitude and enthusiasm for the outdoors are a must. In order to grow our stewardship efforts, we first need people to champion our cause.

The committee meets quarterly to review the past quarter's activities and to plan for the upcoming months' priorities. In addition to participating in quarterly meetings, the committee members contribute in at least one of the initiatives set forth by the committee.

Stewardship Saturdays continue to be a cornerstone of our committee, held on the 3rd Saturday of each month (except December). This past April, May, and June, 23 volunteers logged 93 hours towards flagging invasive shrub species south of the Nashua trail and pulling two patches of invasive Garlic Mustard along Central Avenue. We look forward to a growing volunteer force on the upcoming dates: August 15, September 19, October 17, and November 21.

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES AT THE CONSERVATORY

When the DNR took over the management of Belle Isle in 2014, the Conservatory was facing several serious challenges: infrastructure, an old and redundant plant collection, lackluster gardens and a breakdown of the volunteer program.

Primary is the failing infrastructure of the facility itself. Despite the installation of new pipes and fin tubing in 2007 and new in-house boilers in 2011, the heating system remained inadequate in the cold temperatures of Michigan winters. Combined with electrical power outages on the island and an ancient electrical system within the Conservatory, there were several incidents where power was lost

and the plant collection was seriously impacted. The DNR immediately picked up on this and began short term and long range planning for the heating system. The DNR is preparing a RFP for a design/ build contractor to repair the existing boilers and pipes to stabilize both the Conservatory's and Aquarium's heating systems. Their future plans are to completely overhaul the climate control systems to meet modern standards for aquatic and floral collections

and visitor comfort. Additionally, the Conservatory's dome is in need of a complete restoration as are all the "houses" within the building including new venting systems, glass replacement and electrical and plumbing upgrades.

The second challenge is that the Conservatory's collection had not been refurbished in years. While there were hundreds of plants, many were repeats and at the end of their life cycle. Since the hiring of the Head Horticulturist Jeremy Kemp and the four DNR Conservation

Corps workers, they have been afforded the time to work in each house removing spent and surplus plants. The Belle Isle Conservancy (BIC) has been fortunate to have several

garden clubs and individuals donate funds to the Conservatory, which are being utilized to add to the collection. The Lincoln Park and Garfield Park Conservatories in Chicago have also donated plant material to us with BIC funding to transport them back to Detroit. As a result, you will see displays with a greater diversity, plants that better fit the houses' particular environment and creative displays within each area.

Thirdly, the gardens have been in dire need of refurbishing. The Perennial Garden had become overgrown with grass and weeds. The existing specimens are being moved to other areas within the sunken garden and gazebo areas with plans to create an arboretum to

> replace the perennial garden. Shrubs have been trimmed and opening up vistas to the Dossin but there have been great improvements.

removed from the back fence at the end of the sidewalk and Carillon area. The Lily Pond is in need of a complete renovation of the pond and restoration of the garden areas. There is still a long way to go with the gardens,

The volunteer program had been dwindling in numbers,

but there is a new spirit of cooperation. Many groups and individuals have worked to help in the Conservatory, gardens and with our educational programs. With the help of our new volunteer coordinator, Genevieve Nowak, we hope to grow our volunteer hours and have a greater impact on the Conservatory.

By working in cooperation with the DNR and its employees and by generating interest and funding for various projects and needs, we hope to take the Conservatory well into its second 100 years.

DNR ANNUAL REPORT ON BELLE ISLE SUMMARY

The annual report is now available on the park website, **www.belleislepark.org**. The report gives a great sense of the many community contributions and partnerships which have helped restore Belle Isle in its first year as a state park. A few highlights from the report:

Visitation

Between 2013 and 2014, attendance increased for all of the major island attractions: Anna Scripps Whitcomb Conservatory (+45,400), Belle Isle Nature Zoo (+6,850), Belle Isle Aquarium (+37,385) and Dossin Great Lakes Museum (+15,465). MDOT traffic counters recorded more than 2 million visitors since June 1, 2014.

Investment

Between November 2013 (when the initial lease agreement was signed between the City of Detroit and the DNR) and September 30, 2014 (the end of the state fiscal year), Belle Isle received an investment of \$11.89 million, including \$1.56 million in grant funding. Funding was received from AmeriCorps, U.S. Forest Service, Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, Coastal Zone Management, Great Lakes Fisheries Trust Fund and other grant sources.

Vendors

In 2014 the DNR awarded contracts to 11 food vendors and 13 service providers. These contracts not only provide highly-desired services to island visitors, but also support the local economy, with 11 of these contracts being for Detroit businesses. In addition to the continuing services of inflatable rentals, party equipment rentals, disc golf and pedicab rides, Belle Isle visitors can now enjoy beach umbrella and chair rentals, meal, snack and dessert options, porta-potties, both electric and horse-drawn carriage rides, kayak rentals, toy sales and more.

2015 efforts

Priorities for 2015 will include heating and ventilation system replacement, recreation structure improvements, tree plantings, trail improvements and athletic complex renovation (plus ongoing efforts such as restroom restorations). A strategic plan was also developed in December 2014 to guide and focus the Belle Isle enhancement efforts. The plan incorporated input from BIPAC, the DNR, Belle Isle Conservancy, partners and the public, and will help to ensure progress in the five major areas of Safe and clean park; customeroriented thinking; stewardship and community spaces; partnership and alliances; and continuous improvement.



MICHIGAN STATE PARK RECREATION PASSPORT

The Recreation Passport is now required on all passenger vehicles entering Belle Isle Park consistent with all other Michigan state parks. Recreation Passports can be purchased from a park ranger at the visitor contact station on the island, located on Sunset Drive — after crossing the MacArthur Bridge, take the road to the right going toward the Scott Fountain and Sunset Point. The visitor contact station will be open for Recreation Passport purchases from 6 am to 9 pm every day from May through September. If you already have your Recreation Passport, there is a lane to the left side of the booth where you can pass through slowly without stopping.

Recreation Passports can also be purchased at the following locations in downtown Detroit:

Outdoor Adventure Center

(www.michigan.gov/outdooradventure), located at 1801 Atwater Street at the corner of Atwater and Orleans Streets (in the former Globe Building). The Outdoor Adventure Center is open 8 am to 5 pm Monday-Friday.

 Milliken State Park and Harbor, located at 1900 Atwater Street. The administrative office is open 8 am to 4 am Monday-Friday.

The Recreation Passport is also available for purchase:

- With the Secretary of State during license plate registration renewal (at any branch office, online or kiosk)
- At any Michigan State Park and recreation area
- Online, for non-Michigan registered vehicle ONLY, by visiting www.michigan.gov/estore and by clicking on "State Park Recreation Passport" on the left navigation bar

The Recreation Passport is \$11 for Michigan-registered vehicles and \$5 for motorcycles. A daily motor vehicle permit is available for \$9 for non-Michigan registered vehicles. An annual motor vehicle permit is available for \$31 for non-Michigan registered vehicles. This includes vehicles belonging to persons traveling from out of state to reunions or other shelter events, as well as non-Michigan rental vehicles. Motor vehicle permits for non-Michigan registered vehicles can be purchased at the park or online at www.michigan.gov/estore by clicking on "State Park Recreation Passport."

Pedestrians, bicyclists and those using public transportation can enter the park for free and do not need the passport.

The Recreation Passport helps fund and gains access to all 102 Michigan state parks, recreation areas, state forest campgrounds and non-motorized trail heads and boat launches. It also assists in improving neighborhood parks through the Recreation Passport community grants program.
