DEVELOPMENT NEWS

We had a great Belle Isle Summer Saturdays (BLISS) season, thanks to funding from Charter One. Back for its second year, BLISS Saturdays occurred on the third Saturday each month throughout the summer. Featured were the Belle Isle Aquarium and Anna Scripps Whitcomb Conservatory's 110th Birthday Party as well as the Belle Isle Beer Garden,

presented by the Belle Isle Conservancy Emerging Patrons Council. New BLISS activities this year included dance lessons and the distribution of free recreation passports, in addition to returning activities of yoga, kayaking, and arts and crafts.

The 10th annual Polish the Jewel Belle Isle Legacy Luncheon was held on September 17th at the Belle Isle Casino emceed by JoAnne Purtan. Over 450 women (and some men!) attended the event, decked out in their finest shoes and chapeaus. Throughout the past ten years, the luncheon has raised over \$2.5 million for island improvement projects. Thanks to generous support from attendees and corporate sponsors like DTE Energy, this year's luncheon raised \$140.000 in net revenue.

We're thankful to the Fenton family for their generous gift which enabled the reopening of the Aquarium's skylights and the renovation of 11 fish tanks which now feature starfish, clownfish, jellyfish, and seahorses. Come down to the Aquarium to check out the new improvements! Butzel Long celebrated its 160th birthday by sponsoring the resurrection of the Belle Isle Aquarium's weather vane. Bruce Gerlach was the winner of the weather vane design competition, and its construction is underway. We also received a grant from the GM Foundation to fund the formalization of our field trip program to the Aquarium and Conservatory as well as provide free swimming lessons in partnership with the DNR at the Belle Isle Beach this summer.

From programs to physical improvements and new additions, there's a significant amount of positive momentum on Belle Isle.

A lot of people have been asking, "What's the next major project for Belle Isle?" To answer that question, we are embarking on a strategic planning process this winter, thanks to funding from the Hudson-Webber Foundation, which will help us prioritize the needs across the island and identify future major projects to direct funds towards.

BAREFOOT BEACH CLEAN UP

On Wednesday, August 6, 40 volunteers joined together to collect a total of 14 pounds of trash along the Belle Isle north shore from the South Fishing Pier to the eastern edge of the beach. Barefoot Wine hosted this public Adopt-a-Beach™ cleanup teaming with the Alliance for the Great Lakes and the Belle Isle Conservancy. The 14 teams recorded the various types of items collected, performed water tests at three different locations and noted beach usage. Afterward, the group moved on to the Detroit Yacht Club for refreshments proved by Barefoot Wine. The Alliance also held additional Adopt-a-Beach cleanups around the Great Lakes, including one at Belle Isle Beach held on September 20. The August 6th event was dedicated to Mary Waterstone, who was an advocate for Belle Isle preservation and lead this event the past couple of years.

RESURGENCE OF THE PEOPLE'S ISLAND

A two-day program commemorating the achievements of Frederick Law Olmsted, Sr. took place on Thursday, October 9 at the MSU campus and **Friday, October 10** on Belle Isle. The MSU Landscape Architectural Alumni Advisory Board teamed with members of the Belle Isle Conservancy and Friends of Detroit Rowing to host the event on Belle Isle. Dr. Ethan Carr, FASLA, renowned Olmsted scholar from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, presented the Belle Isle Isle Iecture, "Frederick Law Olmsted: Portrait of a Designer". It was held at the historic Boat Club where BIC President, Michele Hodges presented former Mayor Dave Bing with a plaque to commemorate his part in the resurgence of Belle Isle. A reception was held at the Belle Isle Aquarium afterward where a display of Olmsted's work, created by Janet Anderson, was installed in several tanks at the Aquarium.

THE GARDEN PARTY

The Garden Party at the Conservatory was celebrated on **September 9**, a picture perfect evening with guests arriving to the jazz sounds of the Ben Sharkey trio. The event, catered by T&M Catering with wine tasting offered by Great Lakes Wine and Spirits, provided a wonderful Belle Isle experience to over 400 guests. We had many positive compliments on the improvements to the Conservatory since the DNR agreement. We want to thank our sponsor, Parkway Chrysler Dodge and the many donors who supported this event. Kudos goes out to co-chairs Sonya Ackman and Robin Heller and their committee for planning this delightful affair. We were able to net nearly \$15,000 to start the architectural study, plans and specifications necessary to rejoining the Aquarium and Conservatory at the Show House Ivy wall.





PLANTING DAFFODILS ON BELLE ISLE

For the seventh year, the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association donated 20,000 daffodils to Belle Isle matched by an additional 20,000 by the DNR. In early October, these were planted in various sites around the island. Robin Heller chaired the Michigan WNF&GA committee tasked with planning this event. DNR Conservatory staff augured the 40,000 holes, which was quite a feat! This could not have been done without the volunteers from University of Detroit/Mercy students, the DSO Day of Service, Challenge Detroit, DTE Energy CareCorps, several garden clubs and the Belle Isle Conservancy. Thanks go out to Robin Heller for leading the charge, Erica Hill for helping to coordinate volunteers, Bob Clancy and Jeremy Kemp of the DNR for support and help with the project, Julie Boomer of DTE for connecting us to the Challenge Detroit and DTE volunteers, Kenny Adejeski of Challenge Detroit, Jedidiah Allen of DTE, and to the U of D Jesuit High School volunteers. All the volunteers want to come back next year to see the daffodils in bloom and help with the 2015 fall planting. The Michigan WNF&GA plans to raise \$100,000 in the next two years to plant 500,000 daffodils to add to 125,000 planted so far. The 2015 Daffodil Luncheon will be held at the DYC on Wednesday, April 15 with John Cullen, President of World Cup of Gardening and owner of Celtic Gardens as the keynote speaker.

FALL KOI TRANSFER

On Saturday, November 8, the air was chilly and a light rain fell all morning, but that did not detour about 200 people (probably 100 were kids) from showing up at the Aquarium with their 5 gallon buckets. Several Aquarium volunteers in high boots were netting koi in the pond and putting them in the buckets. They were then carried by the kids to the koi's winter home in the basement tanks. Smiles abounded as they came to the tent to collect their prize (a hot dog, a bag of chips and a bottle of water). DNR staff earlier removed the pond plants and prepared for the upcoming koi wrangling. Thank you to all the volunteers who participated, the people who came out and for the support from local businesses who provided the supplies for the hot dog roast. Many people also brought items from our wish list on the Belle Isle Conservancy website to donate – thank you also for those items. Supporting businesses were: American Coney Island, Wolverine Packing Company, Better Made Potato Chips, Kroger in Warren (12 Mile Rd. and Dequindre) and Target in Madison Heights (14 Mile Rd. and John R). Watch for the announcement of our Spring Koi Transfer and join in on the fun.

BELLE ISLE TREE PLANTING

It was a cold, cold morning on **Friday, November 14** when 120 volunteers reported to the Scott Fountain. The task was to help The Greening of Detroit and the DNR plant 120 cherry trees around the Scott Fountain and lagoon. 100 cherry trees were originally planted there by volunteers in 1994. The original trees were donated to the people of Detroit as a token of friendship and goodwill jointly by The Japanese Business Society of Detroit and the citizens of Tokyo, Japan, a sister city of Detroit. Over the years, some of trees have died and were replaced in 2009. This 2014 planting again replaced dead trees and added cherry trees around the lagoon. Thank you to The Greening of Detroit and all the volunteers who helped to plant them. Come down to the Scott Fountain in May and see the beautiful cherry blossoms.

KICK OFF FOR NEW RESTORATION PROJECT

The Alliance for the Great Lakes, Friends of the Detroit River, the Belle Isle Nature Zoo and other Belle Isle stakeholders held a kick off for two new restoration projects on the island Nov. 5 at the Belle Isle Nature Zoo. The public was invited to attend. Both projects have been funded by the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration Marine Debris Program and Great Lakes Restoration Program.

The North Fishing Pier Shoreline Restoration and Public Involvement Project includes removing a section of an old seawall from the North Fishing Pier and replacing it with a natural shoreline.

Connecting Lake

Okonoka and Blue Heron Lagoon to Improve Fishery Habitat Project will complete restoration work started by recent improvements at the Blue Heron Lagoon and the South Fishing Pier. Completed in 2013, the Blue Heron Lagoon was reconnected to the Detroit River allowing fish larvae to enter the lagoon to grow in its shallow water nursery habitats immediately downstream from the spawning reef. The newly rebuilt Belle Isle Sturgeon Spawning Reef near the South Fishing Pier has been the site of reproduction of 16 species of fish where spawning was non-existent.

Good news is at hand! The updated nomination for Belle Isle Park is complete. Rita Walsh of Vanasse, Hangen, Brustlin, Inc., author of the nomination, presented the final product to three City Council members on Thursday, October 23, winding up a two and a half year process. The next step for the nomination is review and approval by the Michigan State Historic Preservation Review Board before its presentation to the Keeper of the National Register. The review

board meets tri-annually, January, May and September. The goal is to elevate the level of significance to the Federal level, making the park eligible for more grants.

As the nomination moves through the process, City of Detroit's Historic Designation Advisory Board is working in tandem to make Belle Isle Park a local historic district.

NEW EXHIBITS & RESTORED SKYLIGHTS AT AQUARIUM

Belle Isle Aquarium's festive "Light up the Aquarium 2" holiday gala and silent auction will take place Friday, December 5, 2014 at the Aquarium. 
It is an exciting time for the Belle Isle Conservancy's Island Stewardship Conservation Committee. Dedicated volunteers over the last five years have sponsored the Stewardship Workdays monthly, every third Saturday. Committee Chair Mebby Pearson collaborated with Sam Lovall of Friends of the Detroit River. Sam took the lead for

an invasive species grant offered by the Environmental Protective Agency to reduce, if not eliminate, four invasive plants on Belle Isle that enjoy its wet ecosystems. The four bad actors - Japanese Knotweed, Reed Canary Grass, Phragmites, and Purple Loosestrife – plus twelve additional invasives are outlined in an exciting new brochure developed through a grant from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative. This successful venture also included the DNR. WSU Science Professor Dr. Jeffrey Ram and interns, Department of Environmental Quality, Michigan Sea Grant, Belle Isle Nature Zoo, Student Conservation Association (SCA) and The Greening of Detroit.

The grant required an education component which fit neatly with the Belle Isle Aquarium and the Belle Isle Nature Zoo, natural gathering places for educational purposes. Signage and educational opportunities were developed in both locations highlighting invasive plants and aquatic animals that are detrimental to the island's ecosystems.

Visiting both sites gives lots of information about the challenges on Belle Isle that must be continually addressed so the ecosystems may begin to heal better serving visitors, both man and animal.

The SCA and Greening worked with local professionals to map the invasive plants on the island with the assistance of the DNR. Look for the full color brochure "Belle Isle Park's Least Wanted Invasive Plants," pictured with a fun explanation to help people identify the problem plants. In an attempt to increase environmental literacy in Detroit, it is set up as a self-guided tour and game that school children, individuals, and families should enjoy.



BOARD MEMBERS:

Board of Directors

The Belle Isle Conservancy is governed by a 19-member board of directors, including two appointees from the City of Detroit and one from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.
