Delmer Hartwig returns from hunt, claims his big win in Toronto

Killaloe -- Friends of Delmer Hartwig say the 51-year-old Killaloearea resident has a million dollar view from his log home that sits on the side of a hill along the 16th Concession (Rochefort Road) overlooking an expanse of forests and fields to the north towards the Village of Killaloe and providing a panoramic view of Golden Lake to the east.

The only difference now, they say, is that he has the million dollars to go with the view. In fact, the former truck driver has \$15 million to go with the view after picking up his big cheque at the Ontario Lottery Gaming (OLG) office last Thursday in Toronto.

Mr. Hartwig purchased the winning ticket at A.J.'s Convenience store, owned by Steve and Jenn Dashney in Killaloe for the Friday, September 13 draw (who says the 13th is unlucky?) and went into the store the next day to

check the numbers only to discover with some good friends and didn't that when he validated his ticket, the lottery terminal started to chime and then display the words **Big Winner** on the screen before it shut down.

No one knew how much Mr. Hartwig had won until a representative from the OLG office phoned the store to say the ticket holder was worth a cool \$15 million.

Mr. Hartwtig told OLG officials he stayed calm and tried to figure out how much he had won before the phone call came through to the store. And when the representative told him \$15 million, Mr. Hartwig admitted he was in shock.

But that didn't stop him from still thinking about his upcoming elk hunting trip. In fact, lottery officials were more than a bit surprised when Mr. Hartwig told them he wouldn't be going to Toronto to claim the prize until after the trip.

"I had planned to go elk hunting

want to cancel," Mr. Hartwig said. "So, I thought the money could wait at OLG for a few days.'

Mr. Hartwig later told friends around home that his co-hunters were depending on him for the hunt and there was no way he was going to let

them down. After returning from the hunt, Mr. Hartwig picked up his \$15 million cheque at the OLG Prize Centre but he still couldn't believe his good fortune

"This has not sunk in yet, but once I see my bank account, I may finally believe it," he exclaimed.

After working 25 years as a truck operator for Visneskie Trucking and Visneskie Logging, Mr. Hartwig phoned his bosses, Dale and Glenn Visneskie to tell them he was retiring. No more early rises in the winter at 2 a.m. to plow and sand the roads into Algonquin Park to make them passable for the trucks hauling logs.

Despite losing one of their most dedicated and dependable employees, his former bosses were happy for him, but know they will have a difficult time to find someone to fill his boots.

After several days, Mr. Hartwig now has a few ideas about what to do with his windfall. "I want to keep this simple," he said. "I want to share some money with family and friends, give some to charity and maybe buy a new car. I may splurge on an extreme hunting trip in the Northwest Territo-

ries or the Yukon." He also plans to stay in the Killaloe community where his father, Franklin and mother, Mona Wills and his two brothers and one of two sisters also reside.

"I will be spending some of the jackpot cash to fix my home in Killaloe because that is where I grew up. I love that place!"
