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
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Chief's Message

As Police Chief and a proud member of the Bedford Police Department, I am honored to present the 2007 Annual Report. Highlights from this report positively showcase our efforts to reduce crime. We pride ourselves for our commitment and dedication in providing the highest level of service that is unparalleled to other departments of our comparable size.

Although we feel that we adequately maintain the current sense of safety for those who reside and work in this great city, we realize that there are future obstacles to overcome. These obstacles will require us to continue to utilize all

of our resources to remain informed and highly trained to deal with the issues of our ever changing world and ever changing community; but more importantly, it will require that we never allow ourselves to become complacent. The safety of our citizens is paramount to the Bedford Police Department.



Over the course of year 2007, we recognized several significant accomplishments, including hosting our first annual open house. This event was well received by the community with over 400 citizens in attendance. In addition, we hosted an additional Pet Fair in the fall that that was also a success.

This year marked the first full year since the implementation of our new towing policy for those who operate a car with no insurance. Over five-hundred vehicles were towed in accordance with this policy. Another accomplishment included the approval of a Red Light Ordinance that paved the way for the installation of automated red light cameras. These cameras will hopefully reduce the abundance of red light runners who pose a serious threat to the safety of motorist and pedestrians alike.

Another accomplishment came in the form of a homicide investigation of a convenience store clerk. Members of our Department, especially the Criminal Investigations Division, worked around the clock and due to their dedication to this investigation, three suspects were arrested on capital murder charges within a fifty-four hour time frame from the time that the crime occurred.

Our Department is dedicated to our chosen profession and to the citizens that we serve. We will continue to strengthen our ties with the community who serve as our eyes and ears. We look forward to the future and firmly believe in our motto that "Together We Make the Difference."






Officer Brad Deutch taking his Oath of Office with Chief Flory



Internal Affairs

Members of the Bedford Police Department provide visible, direct public safety services to thousands of people each day. It is inevitable that some citizens will have questions, concerns or complaints about the Department, police procedures, or the conduct of the individual employee(s). The office of Internal Affairs conducts professional and objective investigations regarding allegations of misconduct. Each complaint is investigated thoroughly and a determination is made as to whether the conduct occurred as alleged, and if so, if the conduct was in compliance with law and department policies and procedures.



Explanation of Dispositions

- Unfounded: Evidence disproves the allegation of misconduct.
- Not Sustained: Insufficient evidence, either to prove or disprove the allegation of misconduct.
- Exonerated: Evidence tends to support occurrence, but conduct or action was proper or lawful.
- Sustained: Evidence supports allegation of misconduct.
- Pending: Complaint was filed during the calendar year, but investigation not completed during the same year.



Service Calls

In 2007, the Police Department's citizen calls for service increased by 2%, and officer initiated calls increased by 4%.

The Department experienced a 3% decrease in Priority 1 calls for service in comparison with year 2006. In addition, when comparing the same data to five years ago, Priority 1 calls decreased by 20%.


Each officer assigned to the Patrol Division responded to approximately 493 calls for service and initiated an additional 646 calls¹. Furthermore, while responding to calls for service or field-generated calls, the Patrol Division traveled an estimated 384,500 miles throughout the Bedford city limits; that's equivalent to over 15.4 times around the Earth's equator.

The Bedford Police Department, in accordance with the Texas Racial Profiling Law (Senate Bill No. 1074), collects traffic citation data for the purpose of identifying and responding, if necessary, to concerns regarding racial profiling practices.

The findings of the Bedford Police Department's racial profiling report for 2007 suggests that the Department does not currently experience a problem regarding racial profiling practices. This conclusion is supported by five years of historical data and the fact that there has not been any sustained complaint from the community regarding officer misconduct associated with racial profiling practices.

The Bedford Police Department rejects racial profiling as a law enforcement tactic. We do not encourage, tolerate or condone the use of racial profiling. We are committed to the use of sound police strategies based upon reasonable suspicion, probable cause, the judicious use of police discretion, and the continued development of community relationships.



Traffic & Citations

As in years past, traffic concerns continue to be the “primary” or “leading” source of complaints. The Traffic Division was formed many years ago in order to address our concerns and those of the community. The Traffic Division not only addresses traffic related problems, but they also respond to the majority of all accidents where police are needed/summoned.

¹In 2005, the Police Department was faced with several personnel shortages which resulted in the temporary reassignment of all Traffic personnel for the majority of the year to the Patrol Division in order to facilitate calls for service. With the hiring of new certified officers and the retention of all certified officers during 2006, six of the seven authorized personnel were transferred back to the Traffic Division on a full-time basis. In 2007, six of the seven authorized positions were staffed in the Traffic Division.



Criminal Investigations



The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is responsible for investigating all crimes against persons and/or property, including juvenile cases and special/undercover operations. In 2007, CID assigned 5,049 new cases and 2,373 were cleared through investigations; that equates to an overall case clearance rate of 47%.

Violent crime offenses include murder, sexual assaults, robbery and aggravated assaults. In 2007, overall violent crimes increased by only 1% for the second year in a row.



Domestic Violence


Domestic violence has become a crisis not only to the nation, but to the world as a whole. Domestic Violence has no barriers and spans across all social and economical lines. According to a 2000 UNICEF study, 20-50% of the female population of the world will become the victims of domestic violence. Women are 5 to 8 times more likely than men to be victimized and only around half of all domestic violence cases are reported to authorities. The Bedford Police Department promptly assists victims of domestic violence to receive the resources they need to remove them from a volatile situation or living condition.

In 2007, Domestic Violence cases decreased by 11%, marking the second year in a row for a notable decrease.


Domestic Violence Cases: 2003 - 2007

Legend: Tan = Alcohol, Gray = Drug


