# **Thread Catcher**

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#### Materials Needed:

- (1) Fat Quarter
- (1) 4" Wood Embroidery Hoop (inside ring only) Light Weight Cardboard (big enough for (2) 4" circles)

Light Weight Batting for (1) 4" Circle Matching Thread



#### **CUTTING**

#### Fabric:

Cut (1) 11"x14" rectangle

Cut (2) 4" circles

o Use the inside of the hoop to draw the circle, then cut 1" OUTSIDE the drawn line

#### Cardboard

Cut (2) 3-7/8" circles

o Use the inside of the hoop to draw the circle, then cut approximately 1/8" INSIDE the drawn line.

## Batting

Cut (1) 3-7/8" circle

o Cut (1) circle the same size as the cardboard

#### **CONSTRUCTION**

#### Bases:

## **Batting Base**

- o (1) fabric circle right side down
- o Batting
- o (1) cardboard circle
- o Sew around (like a Yo Yo)

### No Batting Base

- o (1) fabric circle right side down
- o (1) cardboard circle
- o Sew around (like a Yo Yo)

Sandwich the two circles (right sides out)

Whip stitch together



Join wrong sides and whip stitch

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#### Fabric Tube:


Sew the 11"x14" fabric using a ½" seam on the 11" side.

o This forms a tube, press seam open

Fold each end of the tube ¼" and press (tube is wrong side out).

## Fabric Tube and Hoop:

With the tube still wrong side out, slide the embroidery hoop over the tube to the middle. Fold one end of the tube over the hoop matching









At the other end (non-hoop side) tuck the inside fabric out of the way. Hand whip the Batting side of our sandwich circle to the outside edge of the tube. (I put the batting (soft) side of this piece to the outside, so when it's finished the batting is inside the catcher and the cardboard side is on the outside to help stabilize when standing up)







Turn the bottom through the hoop inside out. Sew the remaining side of the tube to the bottom edge of the cardboard circle.









Twist and tuck in the hoop for storage.
