The thirteenth frater in the Alpha Chapter, Lawrence Rosenfeld, P.S.D., had moved from Philadelphia to

Montréal to attend McGill University for graduate work. If the last name looks familiar, it should. Lawrence was the older brother of founding father Stanley Rosenfeld, P.S.D. and the two brothers served as the fraternity's first and second Supreme Directorums. In 1922, then-Supreme Deputy Ephraim G. Sless, P.S.D. traveled to Montréal and the Delta Chapter was established! The following year, the very first Hazy-O was published. It began with remarks from Lawrence Rosenfeld, who was Supreme Directorum at the time. He predicted the following about the publication (later renamed the AZOan):

It will surely be a potent factor in our fraternal life, binding us closer together than has been possible heretofore. It will help us exchange worthy ideas, so that we may all benefit thereby. It will allow us to better enjoy our fraternal relations, by informing us of the activities of our fraters in other chapters.

I could not have said it better myself. My hope is that readers take full advantage of all this publication has to offer, especially if this is your first time reading an AZOan. Use the supreme officer reports to get a glimpse of what each officer does in their roles and to put faces to names that you have seen throughout the year. You will see most, if not all, of the officers at conventions and various interchapter events. The chapter reports will give you insight into what the chapters have all done throughout the year – who knows...you may get an idea for something to do with your own chapter!

Be sure to check out the convention information! You will find the schedule of events, as well as the suggested attire for each event. Different articles and features throughout will give you a window into AZO's deep history and the distinctive contributions that fraters have made to the fraternity over the years.

Supreme Directorum 2015 - 2016

Supreme National Fundraising Project LUSTGARTEN FOUNDATION



The Supreme National Charity for this fraternal year has been the Lustgarten Foundation. The mission of the foundation is to advance the scientific and medical research related to the diagnosis, treatment, cure and prevention of pancreatic cancer. Few charities operate like the Lustgarten Foundation in which 100% of every donation goes directly to research of the disease. While pancreatic cancer accounts for only about 3% of cancer diagnoses, it is the fourth leading cause of cancer-related deaths, accounting for 7% of total cancer-related deaths. Also, while the survival rates of other types of cancers have improved in recent years, unfortunately the rates for pancreatic cancer have remained stagnant.

In addition to the staggering survival statistics, this disease hits close to home for many of us in AZO. A number of fraters and family members have lost their lives to the disease, including Dr. Jeffrey M. Levy, Donald Langan Sr., and Dr. Albert J. Puccia. In remembrance of those lost and those currently affected by the disease, chapters held numerous events to spread awareness of the disease in order to raise money for the Lustgarten Foundation. Nu chapter held a prescription spelling bee where teams attempted to spell drug names. Psi chapter held casual dress days, where students who donated money would be able to dress casually for the day, as their campus is professional dress only. Lambda Nu held a bowl-a-thon where friends and family could donate money in a flat sum, or per pin knocked over. Epsilon had a very successful Crowdriser, where people donated money based on how they wanted Frater Adit Desai to shave his facial hair. With these, as well as many other events, AZO did a fabulous job in promoting and supporting the national charity.

We would like to thank the fraters who have supported the Lustgarten Foundation and for the opportunity to serve the fraternity. We have made great contributions this year through your constant efforts and generous donations on behalf of Alpha Zeta Omega. It has been a pleasure working with everyone through another successful year, and we encourage continued support for the Lustgarten Foundation. 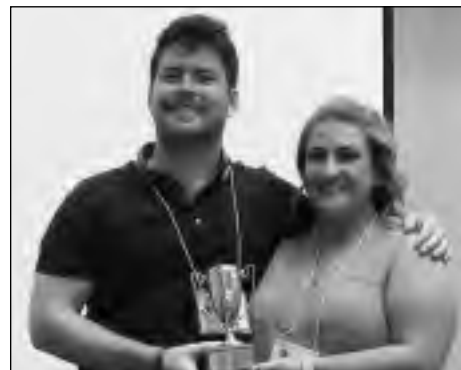

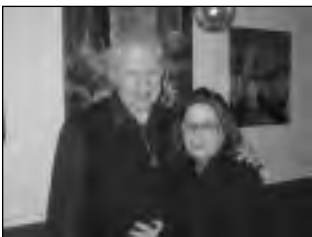

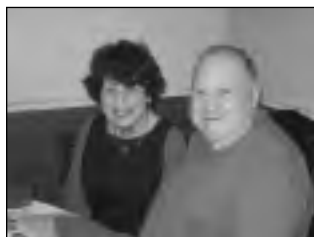

Every summer growing up Emily would spend a month with her grandmother in Wells, Maine where she first started to take an interest in pharmacy. Her grandmother had Type 2 Diabetes so they would regularly visit her local pharmacist to pick up prescriptions or discuss other health problems. It was watching this interaction between her grandmother and her pharmacist that made Emily decide that she wanted to become a pharmacist.

During her freshmen year at UCONN Emily struggled with fitting in. She had left her small hometown and tight group of friends and she was suddenly in a new area without friends. A change occurred upon meeting the brothers in Alpha Zeta Omega and seeing how she could have a “mini pharmacy family” away from home. Emily was inducted into the fraternity in Fall 2009 and could not wait to become more involved. For her first year in the fraternity Emily was elected Pledge Master and worked hard to bring her 20 pledges closer together and start some traditions. This became extremely important to her when she had to leave after not being accepted into the UCONN School of Pharmacy. While home, Emily realized that she would not be happy unless she gave her dream of becoming a pharmacist one more shot, and decided to apply to a pharmacy school that had left a lasting impression with her. This led to her applying and being accepted into the University of New England’s fourth pharmacy class.

Upon being accepted to UNE she reached out to the

administrative staff to see if she would be able to start a chapter of Alpha Zeta Omega upon starting school. Her first year of pharmacy school was filled with amazing memories like her family finally seeing her get her white coat, volunteering around Portland, and being hired as an official intern with Rite Aid. In her spare time she never forgot AZO and visited other chapters and attended National Conventions to stay up to date with fraternal affairs. At UNE Emily flourished and became the student she always wanted to be. During her P2 year she renewed her efforts and pushed harder to start a chapter of AZO. She reached out to her fellow brothers, the administration at UNE, and the friends she had made to double her efforts. Thankfully luck was on her side and in May of 2014 she and 19 other Fraters were inducted as the founding class of the Lambda Nu chapter.

For her final year of classes at UNE, and as the first Directorum for Lambda Nu, she wanted to make sure that all of her hard work was not done in vain. Emily coached the other members of Lambda Nu and tried to educate them in all of the ways of AZO. Together each chair and executive board member documented all their work for future years to look back upon. All of the milestones and achievements would never have been possible without the support of her family, friends, fraters, and her fiancé, Sam. With her degree now in sight Emily is hoping to become a pharmacist that will be able to make a difference in her patients’ lives just like one did so long ago for her grandmother. She would truly like to thank everyone for always pushing her to be her best and never settle for anything but her dreams.

Undergrads: You Are the Present

There is a widely expressed comment about how undergrads are the future of the fraternity. This type of comment or viewpoint seems reasonable on the surface. But a closer review of the viewpoint means that you are not yet fully skilled to contribute to the fraternity and that you need to look to the future to become fully vested and involved. But that is not true. Undergrads, you are not the future of the fraternity but, rather, you are the present.

As undergraduate fraters, you are active in your chapter. In most of the UG chapters, just about every frater has some 'job' for which they are responsible. The UG chapters are running professional programs from Brown Bag drug reviews, to diabetes screenings, to charitable community work on and off campus: all involving planning and group involvement. As UG fraters, you are maintaining a structure with officers, interactions with the college, building an alumni network, and more. And, of course, you maintain a social structure and level of involvement that ties not only your local fraters together but also includes fraters from other chapters. There is no reason to believe that you cannot have that same kind of involvement at the national level. As long-time members of the fraternity, we often take the viewpoint that there will be certain undergrad fraters who will take on a leadership role nationally and who will be our leaders at some ephemeral time yet to come: that your current time as UG fraters is more like a clerkship rotation where you learn how national works and let the graduate fraters run things. Do not allow this delayed involvement to continue. Take on the same activity nationally as you do

locally. Duplicate those talents and personal gifts you have and give to your local chapter and bring them national.

The fraternity lives for the now and plans for the future. To expect anything different from its undergraduate members is detrimental to the UG fraters and to the fraternity as a whole. As an undergraduate frater, your value to the fraternity and your contributions are just as important as the frater celebrating their 10th or even 50th year in the fraternity. You have a viewpoint on the fraternity and on issues that are relevant to the current conversation. Your present-day input into the direction of the fraternity allows the fraternity to better plan for its future. And with this input, it will be a future with which you will more likely want to remain involved. Undergrads involved with the fraternity on the chapter and the national level increases not only the current activity level of the fraternity, but it also increases the future level because you are more likely to remain active in an organization that you helped shape.

There is a further synergy in that your increase in activity in the present leads to your sustained activity in the future. But this current day increased activity drives even more outside interest in the fraternity and further increases the future membership and activity of the fraternity. Now here's a problem that the fraternity needs to have: geometrically increased activity. As Mona Lisa Vito says at the end of *"My Cousin Vinny"*: "Oh my God, what a f***ing nightmare!". Be that nightmare.

Brian Pinto, P.S.D., Epsilon

Brian Pinto was born November 30, 1979, in Newark, New Jersey, the first-born son of Isabel and Jose Pinto, recent immigrants from Portugal. After spending a few years in the Ironbound section of Newark, the family moved to nearby Kearny where Brian spent the rest of his youth and where his parents still reside today.

By the time Brian started his freshman year at Kearny High School, he already had an interest in chemistry and medicine. His mother, a trained nurse, kindly advised him that he did not possess a surgeon's hands and should possibly explore some other careers outside of medicine. Eventually he landed upon the study of pharmacy and began working as a technician and front store assistant manager of the local CVS. While in high school, Brian excelled in his studies, earning a place in the National Honor Society. He also served multiple terms on Student Council and acted as Student Council Secretary his senior year.

When it came time for Brian to choose an institution of higher learning, his motivation was to stay close to his family, but still obtain a true college experience. Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, College of Pharmacy, was a perfect fit. It was close enough for Brian to commute back to Kearny to work on weekends at the pharmacy but still far enough away that he had a sense of independence.

Brian was rushed by AZΩ and pledged the fraternity during the spring semester of 1998 as a freshman. He was initially drawn to the camaraderie of the fraternity, but soon after he began pledging, he obtained a much deeper sense of what Alpha Zeta Omega would even-

tually mean to him. Upon his initiation into the Epsilon Chapter of AZΩ, Brian hit the ground running. He was nominated as the AZΩ representative to the Pharmacy Governing Council in his second year of college. In his third year, Brian served as the Epsilon chapter exchequer and then as the Pharmacy Governing Council President in his fourth year. In Brian's fifth and final year of Pharmacy school at Rutgers, he served as the Directorum of the Epsilon Chapter and as his College of Pharmacy Class President as well! In addition to the numerous leadership roles he held throughout college, Brian was also inducted into the Rho Chi Honor Society, the Phi Lambda Sigma Leadership Society, and the prestigious Rutgers secret society, Cap and Skull. This honor is bestowed upon only 18 students handpicked from throughout the entire university each year!

Throughout all his service to AZΩ and to Rutgers, he still continued working as a pharmacy technician, eventually landing at a small independent store, Midtown Pharmacy, in his hometown. It was here that Brian caught the "ownership" bug and focused on this path for himself after graduation. This desire grew deeper once Brian learned of the storied history of those many fellow AZΩ fraters that had owned stores before him. Brian took a job with another independent store, Bell Pharmacy in Edison, New Jersey, upon passing his board exam. He worked here for about three years before purchasing Tiffany Natural Pharmacy in Westfield in 2005. Not only acting in the capacity as the owner

of the store, Brian is also the head pharmacist and continues to serve Rutgers as a preceptor for their rotation program, mentoring pharmacy students, including a several AZΩ fraters from across the country. Brian is now a part owner in four other pharmacies across New Jersey but what makes him proudest of his professional accomplishments is the opportunity to offer AZΩ fraters opportunities as either pharmacy technicians, staff pharmacists, and even some as pharmacist owners.

Brian has maintained a high level of activity with the Epsilon graduate chapter since leaving Rutgers in 2002 and was one of the core group of fraters that has helped lead to Epsilon's resurgence within the national fraternity. He had always remained active at the Supreme level, attending every convention from January of 2000 till about 2012. He has also made numerous trips to other chapters across the country including Tau, Kappa, Milwaukee, New York, Nu, Pi Rho, Philadelphia, and of course a few times to Sigma. He started his formal service to the Supreme Chapter in 2004, serving first as the AZΩan editor, followed by

two years as Signare, and one year at Exchequer. In 2007, Brian took a year off to marry his beautiful wife and fellow frater Leann Clymer in the spring of 2008 and served as Sub-Directorum before being installed as Supreme Directorum in Philadelphia in 2009. He continues to serve on various committees but his biggest contribution is his collaboration with Lou Flacks, P.S.D. and their efforts to fundraise to help offset the costs of AZΩans. Between the both of them they have raised tens of thousands of dollars to help offset the cost of conventions and allow younger fraters the opportunity to experience AZΩ the way he had almost 20 years earlier.

These days you can find Brian managing his group of pharmacies and keeping his eyes peeled for future opportunities. But the thing that drives him now is the birth of his daughter Vitoria this past March. With Leann by his side and now settled in their dream house in Summit, New Jersey, Brian is looking forward to the continued impact that he hopes to make on pharmacy and especially on AZΩ.

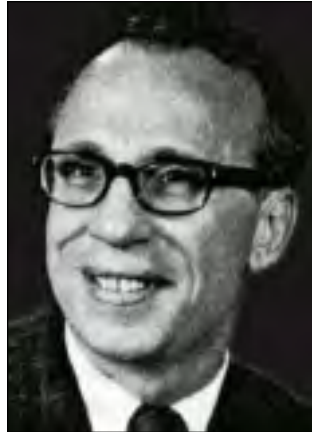
Herb Garde was born in Philadelphia and attended Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science for two years. Army service during World War II interrupted his education, which he resumed upon discharge in 1946. He joined Alpha Zeta Omega Beta Chapter on November 16, 1947. While in pharmacy school, Herb started and successfully operated his own manufacturing company. He continued his practice with executive positions in manufacturing and the drug wholesale industry.

In Supreme, he served for two terms as Bellarum, Excheque, 2nd Sub-Directorum, 1st Sub-Directorum and 1965-1966 Supreme Directorum. His first act as Directorum solved a problem that existed since AZO's founding. By creating the office of Director of Fraternal Affairs, Herb found a way to keep Past Supreme Directorums active after their term of office. This concept continues to this day. His activity in the Supreme Chapter continued as Board Member and, when created, as Director of Trade Relations.

His first wife, Marilyn, predeceased Herb. He is survived by his wife, Arlyne Weinstock Garde; son, Alan Garde; daughter, TerriAnn Davitch (David), stepchildren, David Weinstock (Rose) and Dr. Marybeth Weinstock; grandchildren Justin Davitch (Arielle), Drew Davitch, and Selena Weinstock.
