## DISCUSSIONS CONTINUE ON FOSSIL STATION CLOSURES


Local 15 and MWGen have held four meetings to discuss the reduction in force (RIF) that will be associated with the closures of the Fisk and Crawford stations. MWGen also announced to management employees last week that it has begun a review of all management positions at all the Illinois stations and among office support staff

To date, we have discussed the process for a RIF, the recall process and have worked to finalize the seniority list. We have also spent quite a bit of time discussing the use of contractors and the future MWGen workforce. There has also been broad discussion about severance and how other companies are handling unit shutdowns and RIFs, but the company has made no offer at this time.

The company has told us that as a result of the Fisk and Crawford closures, there is a need to evaluate the entire fleet from a staffing perspective and that work is happening right now -- for both Represented and non-Represented workers. There was some benchmarking done recently that is being evaluated, and the stations are all looking for ways to help the company get through the next couple of years, which are expected to be even tougher financially given that power prices have continued to drop since the Feb. 29 announcement of the Fisk and Crawford shutdowns.

The next meeting is scheduled for May 14. Both parties want to wrap up these discussions as soon as possible. The company has not given official notification to the

Union as required by the WARN Act. They must give 60 days notice of a plant shutdown that results in a RIF of at least 50 people to comply with this Act. We will continue to communicate with the membership as information becomes available.

# INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT ED HILL DISCUSSES IMPORTANCE OF THE NUCLEAR ACCESS LAWSUIT RULING

On April 26, 2012, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers President Ed Hill sent out a letter to all Local Unions who represent nuclear workers in the United States. The topic of the letter was the lawsuit between Exelon Generation and I.B.E.W Local 15 regarding nuclear access decisions, and the recent court decision in favor of Local 15 by the U.S. Seventh District Court of Appeals. In his letter Mr. Hill described the decision as “an important legal victory that will benefit all organized employees working in the nuclear power industry and help to strengthen our internal and external organizing.” Below is a copy of Mr. Hill’s letter:

**To: All U.S. Local Unions with Nuclear Jurisdiction**

**Dear Sisters and Brothers:**

This letter is to advise about the case between IBEW Local Union 15 and Exelon Generation Company. This is an important legal victory that will benefit all organized employees working in the nuclear power industry and help to strengthen our internal and external organizing.

In *Exelon Generation Co. v. IBEW Local 15*, No. 11-2423 (7<sup>th</sup> Cir. March 29, 2012), the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit held that Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) regulations permit arbitrators to review employer decisions denying union-represented employees unescorted access to nuclear power facilities. The court concluded that employers cannot rely on NRC regulations to avoid their contractual obligation to arbitrate.

The three judge panel unanimously ruled in favor of IBEW Local 15, overturning the previous court decision.

I urge you to seize this opportunity to reach out to unorganized workers inside and outside your respective workplaces. Let them know that true justice on the job can only be achieved by winning the right to bargain as well as the right to arbitrate over access denials, and that union membership will ensure a better future for all working class people.

## CALL CENTER CONSOLIDATION FOCUS GROUP MEETINGS

On April 4, 2012, the third focus group meeting between Company representatives and a team of Call Center employees was held. These ongoing meetings are being held with the employees who perform the day-to-day work in the Call Centers in order to obtain their input when determining the needs of employees at the new location when the Call Centers move to Lincoln Center 2 in Oakbrook later this year.

At this meeting employees were given further details of the new accommodations, which include adjustable workstations (with dual table top-mounted monitors) and ergonomic chairs for all bargaining unit employees. The group was also shown the floor plans for the new Call Center, which included seating and restroom arrangements as well as break room accommodations.

The current plan calls for the Call Center to occupy a portion of the 2nd floor (Resource Management) and the entire 3rd and 4th floors of Lincoln Center 2, with CC1s, CSRs, GC1s, OSSs and OSRs located on the 3rd and 4th floors. The floor plan includes break areas located on both ends of all occupied floors on each level - with each containing microwaves, a refrigerator, a sink, private computer/phone areas and numerous meeting rooms.

Employees participating in this focus group have had (and continue to provide) direct input into the design and accommodations of the new location. # FISK GENERATING STATION HISTORY

With the impending closure of Fisk Station it's a good time for a quick look back at the history of the station.

Thomas Alva Edison invented the light bulb in 1879 but realized that without an electrical system to readily supply power, the light bulb had little practical use. So by 1882 (in New York City) he installed the world's first central generating plant using reciprocating steam engines to run generators. This allowed electricity to become more versatile and valuable as entrepreneurs started building numerous small stations throughout cities.

Fisk Station has the impressive distinction of being the first steam turbine generating station in the United States. Ground was broken for the station by Sam Insull (ComEd founder and former secretary of Thomas Edison) in 1903. Mr. Insull had convinced GE to manufacture a 5 MW turbine-generator, which was 2 MW larger than GE's standard units. Mr. Insull was taking a major risk in a special order of this size but it paid off with the successful operation of Fisk Station.

As many people know, Thomas Edison was a visitor to Fisk station and signed their visitor log-book back in the early 1900's. His signature has been on display at the station for many years.

Fisk was "state of the art" for it's time, reducing emissions and lowering the cost of electricity. It has been regularly maintained and updated throughout the years. The station's last big upgrade was in the late 1950s when they installed the current turbine generator which is Unit 19. This Unit runs regularly and it's capacity is 326 MW, not a big unit by today's standards but huge compared with the Units constructed when it was initially built.

## OSHA A Quick Look

### Section 1 "Introduction"

*To assure safe and healthful working conditions for working men and women; by authorizing enforcement of the standards developed under the Act; by assisting and encouraging the States in their efforts to assure safe and healthful working conditions; by providing for research, information, education, and training in the field of occupational safety and health; and for other purposes.*

### Section 5 "General Duty Clause"

#### (a) (a) Each employer --

*(1) shall furnish to each of his employees employment and a place of employment which are free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm To his employees;*

*(2) shall comply with occupational safety and health standards promulgated under this Act.*

*(b) Each employee shall comply with occupational safety and health standards and all rules, regulations, and orders issued pursuant to this Act which are applicable to his own actions and conduct.*



The regulations in standard 269 address specific hazards faced by workers in the electric utility industry.

**1910.269** *This section covers the operation and maintenance of electric power generation, control, transformation, transmission, and distribution lines and equipment. These provisions apply to:*

*Power generation, transmission, and distribution installations, including related equipment for the purpose of communication or metering, which are accessible only to qualified employees; Note: The types of installations covered by this paragraph include the generation, transmission, and distribution installations of electric utilities, as well as equivalent installations of industrial establishments. ..*

## 2012 WORKERS' MEMORIAL DAY

*"Making a living shouldn't include dying."*

Workers' Memorial Day was commemorated across the nation on Saturday April 28, 2012. The Rockford United Labor Council's ceremony took place at the E.J. 'Zeke' Giorgi State of Illinois Building in downtown Rockford. In Illinois, events occurred in Bloomington, Decatur, Joliet, Peoria, Quad Cities, Springfield and Spring Valley. Though the weather was fittingly dreary, many attended the Rockford ceremony including various labor organizations and officials. Retired Local 15 Business Representative Ron Welte welcomed the guests, including Frances Mijares, widow of IBEW Local 15 Jorge Mijares (December 27, 2002) and Linda Skiles, widow of IBEW Local 15 member Kelly Skiles (March 29, 2011).

Welte also introduced the speakers including Illinois Department of Labor Director Joe Costigan and OSHA Region V Assistant Administrator John Newquist, who reminded the guests of the progress in workplace safety made since the Occupational Safety & Health Act went into effect April 28, 1971. Forty-one years ago, nearly forty workers died on an average day. Much has been accomplished. In 2011, an average of twelve people were killed at work every day in the United States among a work force twice the size of 1970.

Much more needs to be done. Tim Drea, Secretary/Treasurer of the Illinois AFL-CIO, warned about the false claim that safety regulations are job-killers, pointing out the reality that reductions in hard won safe guards are worker killers. Eight years of neglect by the Bush Administration decreased safety protection. Many workers are still in serious danger, as shown by recent disasters at Massey Energy's coal mine (29 killed), the Tesoro Refinery explosion (7 killed) and the BP-Transocean Gulf oil rig explosion (11 killed).

A wreath was placed at the enduring stone Worker's Memorial (see pic below) on the west bank of the Rock River. A Representative from AFSCME 1275 placed flowers to honor fallen IBEW Local 196 Brother Jeffrey Kissack and Brother Daniel Green.

Fifty-seven year old Jeffrey Kissack was electrocuted on April 10, 2011 while restoring power in Rochelle, Illinois. Daniel Green was killed when a turning semi-trailer ran over him while he was working in Elmhurst, on September 12, 2011. He was thirty-eight years old.



# SAFETY

## SAFETY COUNCILS *Neutral Disconnect Missing*



The T&S Cross Regional Safety Council has expended much thoughtful effort to resolve a serious concern; new modular "Concept" substations were not designed with a neutral disconnect. The disconnect separates a neutral connected to a transformer in a substation from the system. It is opened when workers are working near grounded equipment that is normally at earth potential. In the cause of a fault on other equipment connected to the station, high voltages and currents could be pressed onto that equipment and cause serious injury to workers. Return currents seeking the shortest path to earth may also cause the neutral to become unexpectedly energized.

The Safety Council worked with engineers and manufacturers to include the neutral disconnects on future equipment. Retrofitting newer equipment with disconnects has been priced and is being planned for stations not so equipped.

## IBEW INTERNATIONAL SAFETY CAUCUS

### *Local Unions Share Best Practices*

Local 15 members attended the IBEW International Safety Caucus in Madison, Wisconsin on April 18 and 19. Mark Shaulis (Underground), Paul Hussey (Overhead), Ken Franz (Field and Meter Services), Tim Pierce (Overhead), President Dean Apple, Vice-President Terry McGoldrick and Business Representative Terry Sheridan, took part in sessions on fire prevention, Union safety experts (Blue Hats) and other electrical industry safety issues and trends.

International Representative Jim Tomaseski reported on regulations on fall arrest and crane-derrick qualifications. OSHA representatives gave a step-by-step walk through of filing a hazard complaint.

Personal protective equipment misuse and disuse was discussed. Many utilities have seen marked improvement by using Blue Hats. A Blue Hat is an experienced worker, respected by others, knowledgeable about the work and how safe practices are interwoven through a well executed job. They are teachers and demonstrators of safe work practices. Other Unions reported that workplaces using strictly punitive corrections may see an initial drop in reported injuries but there is inevitably a rebound because some workers hide injuries and hazards are not reported.

A representative from the FireAway Company presented their fire suppressant 'Stat-X'. The item is packed in a 5-1/2" tall by 3" diameter can that weighs less than 3 pounds. The product has significant fire "knockdown" and rapid suppression capabilities for enclosed spaces. It is safe for fire fighters and any occupants trapped by fire. There is no oxygen depletion, it stops the chemical reaction of a fire — "suppresses at very low concentrations by interference with free radicals". PECo, among other utilities, has satisfactorily tested the product on man-hole fires. ComEd Safety and Methods have promised to investigate using it on our system.

# LOCAL 15 JOINS RALLY IN SPRINGFIELD

On April 17, 2012, Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker was in Springfield to speak to a group of corporate lobbyists and CEOs, invited by the Illinois Chamber of Commerce. Instead of paying their fair share in taxes, their top priority is slashing the modest pensions earned by teachers and police, firefighters and caregivers and other public employees. Several Local 15 Business Representatives and members joined other workers and supporters to let Walker and Illinois politicians know that his tactics are not welcome here.

Thousands of workers from several states gathered in the streets of Springfield Illinois outside the Abraham Lincoln Hotel to listen to various speakers and let their voices be heard. The spirited crowd demonstrated against the extreme agenda and failed record of Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker. A strong message was sent that Illinois rejects Walker's attacks on collective bargaining rights, pensions and health care as well as his corporate tax giveaways and budget cuts to schools and Medicaid.

The rally was sponsored by "We Are One", a labor coalition working on behalf of over 1 million statewide members to protect public employee pensions. The following is a fact sheet used by the coalition to explain the facts about why we all need to help protect public employee pensions:

## **THE TRUTH ABOUT PUBLIC PENSIONS—WE ARE ONE ILLINOIS**

### ESSENTIAL PUBLIC SERVICES

**Firefighters and police, teachers and nurses, child protection workers and disability caregivers** are just some of the public employees that Illinois residents rely on every day, in every community, in every part of the state.

### POLITICIANS CAUSED PENSION DEBT

**For decades, Illinois politicians shorted or skipped the employer contributions required by law, creating the nation's largest pension debt.** All that time, public employees paid their fair share. It's wrong to punish public employees for the actions—or inaction—of irresponsible politicians.

### PUBLIC EMPLOYEES PAY

**A public employee's pension is his or her own life savings—they typically contribute 8 percent, 9 percent or more from each paycheck to their pension fund.** Illinois public employees have always paid their share, faithfully and in full.

### NO SOCIAL SECURITY

**Most Illinois public employees are ineligible for Social Security.** Unlike every private-sector worker in America, police and firefighters, teachers and university employees, city of Chicago and Cook County employees **don't** qualify for Social Security. Reducing the pension they earn would leave many public employees with little to fall back on in retirement.

### PENSIONS ARE MODEST

**Illinois public employees retire on very modest pensions**—on average, just \$32,000 a year after a career dedicated to public service. Many receive much less than this average amount.

### PROTECTED BY THE CONSTITUTION

**The Illinois Constitution states that membership in a public pension system is an enforceable contractual relationship, "the benefits of which may not be diminished or impaired."** That plain language means it is unconstitutional to reduce pension benefits or increase contributions of current public employees. Legislation violating this constitutional protection will cause a costly and wasteful court challenge.
