Why Study Acupuncture?

Medical professionals who study acupuncture at AIMC Berkeley say they are motivated to learn the Traditional Chinese Medicine tool kit for a variety of reasons. With an acupuncture license, they can look forward to working with greater autonomy or having ability to offer their patients more integrative care.

Medical professionals desire using complementary treatments for their patients with chronic conditions and pain. They would rather dispense nature based medicines in the TCM pharmacopeia than pills from pharmacological firms. They are intrigued to learn a system of medicine that integrates mind, body and spirit. They want a career that is less taxing on them emotionally and physically.

Plus the public perception of the medicine is rising in the US. Increasing numbers of hospitals are hiring acupuncturists. Now insurance companies are required, since 2015, to cover acupuncture

under the affordable Care Act. Even before insurance covered acupuncture, patients were voting with their feet for acupuncture. Acupuncture was one of the fastest growing segments of health care despite the out-of-pocket expense. Recently, The World Health Institute and the National Health Institutes have recognized acupuncture as effective in treating a broad range of conditions from diabetes and allergies to pain management and more. World Health Organization recognizes acupuncture as an effective treatment for 43 diseases and more than 100 indications. (http://www.evidencebasedacupuncture.org/who-official-position).
